OPTIONS FOR AMENDING PREFERENTIAL PARKING PROGRAM

Recommendation:

Hold a public hearing and direct staff to prepare a resolution to amend the preferential parking program as directed with regard to resident and guest vehicle permit pricing, out-of state vehicles, driveway permits, or other matters as directed.

Background/Analysis:

On April 27, July 27, September 28, and October 26, 2010 the Council reviewed various options for amending the preferential parking program and directed staff to provide notice to permit holders and the public concerning possible changes to the preferential parking program as stated following the table.

- 1. Increase the resident parking permit fee from \$40 for each permit, to \$100 for the first permit, \$100 for the second permit, \$200 for the third permit, and \$300 for each additional permit. Parking is a scarce commodity within the City. The large number of parking permits that are being purchased, including those purchased by people with adequate onsite parking, indicates that permits may be priced too low.
- 2. Increase the guest permit fee from \$40 to \$300 for each guest permit. A maximum of one guest permit may be issued per address.
- 3. Vehicles with out-of-state registration will not be issued parking permits, unless the vehicle owner is a student, is in the military, or has dual residency. Under state law, any vehicle owned by a California resident must be registered within 20 days of entry into California with specified exceptions.

- 4. Increase driveway permit fee from \$44 to \$54 to park on the street in front of the owner's driveway. This is a one-time fee and does not affect current permit holders. Within the preferential parking district 515 driveway permits have been issued to date, with a total of 646 issued citywide. The proposed fee of \$54 reflects actual costs to verify conditions and issue the permit. Any fee increase should be applied to driveway permits within and outside the preferential parking district.
- 5. Increase the fee for daily passes from \$6 to \$10 each to park from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. There is no limit on the number of passes that may be purchased and they may be purchased by anyone. Metered parking would cost \$11.25 for the same time period at the current rate of \$1.25 per hour.
- 6. Employee permit fees (currently \$143) may also be discussed. In permit year 2009/2010, 95 businesses purchased a total of 194 employee parking permits.

Correspondence:

Correspondence received to date is attached, and subsequent items will be provided in a supplemental. Some people do not object to modest increases, but they generally object to the proposed substantial increases. A few agreed with the proposal. Here is a sampling of the comments.

- Limit to small, incremental increases (\$5 to \$10, or 5% to 10% increase annually)
- \$40 for 1st and 2nd resident permit, \$300 for additional
- \$50 for resident and guest permits
- \$50 for 1st and 2nd resident permit; \$400 for 3rd
- \$60 for 1st, \$120 for 2nd resident permit
 \$100 for 1st permit, \$1,000 for 2nd and \$5,000 for 3rd permit
- Reduce the fee to \$25 per permit
- Increase fees by \$10 per year
- One permit per person not per vehicle, or penalize more than one vehicle per person.
- Limit of 2 resident and one guest permit
- Make them all free

Look at alternative ways to raise revenues:

- Increase or expand the bed tax.
- License fee for commercial trucks.
- Increase enforcement, increase parking fines.
- Increase area where meters are used, or meter fees.
- Charge more for employee permits especially if residents have to pay more.
- More people would buy day passes if they could be purchased on Friday and the weekend.
- Create an annual entertainment permit with a substantial fee.

Other:

- Renters and people on fixed incomes cannot afford these increases.
- · Apartments lack adequate onsite parking; our older housing stock typically lacks adequate onsite parking. The proposal unfairly impacts these occupants.
- Increased guest pass fees discourage guests which spend money in town.
- Expensive permits will make them a target of vehicle vandalism.
- Expensive permits will cause people to park on streets outside the district.
- Maintaining an affordable price is not about permit value, but about solutions for residents in neighborhoods inundated with outsiders.
- It will be cheaper to simply get ticketed.





Recommendation:

Direct staff to set a public hearing for January 11, 2011 on potential changes to the Preferential Parking Program and notice all current preferential parking program permit holders and the general public.

Background/Analysis:

On July 27, 2010 and September 28, 2010 the Council reviewed various options for amending the preferential parking program, and agreed to seek public comment on the following potential changes to the program. The public hearing notice will also provide a brief summary of each issue.

- To increase the resident vehicle permit and guest permit fees from \$40 to: \$100 each for the first and second permit, \$200 for the third permit, \$300 for each additional permit, and \$300 for a guest permit. The number of permits that could be obtained is not proposed to change (one vehicle permit per registered vehicle and one guest permit per address).
- To not issue parking permits to vehicles with out-of-state license plates, excluding vehicles registered to active military personnel, students who are here attending school, or dual residents. (This may cause a hardship for new residents trying to secure parking prior to reregistering their vehicles; in 2010/11 137 out-of-state vehicles obtained a permit, and 33 vehicles were granted an exemption).
- To increase the one-time driveway permit fee from \$44 to \$54. This permit allows property occupants to park on the street in front of their driveway. People with an existing driveway permit are not affected.

The Council on September 28, 2010 also expressed interest in increasing the fee for a daily pass from \$6 to \$10 per day but then tabled this issue until after discussion of the resident permit fee. The Council is requested to specify whether this proposal should be noticed:

• To increase the fee for a daily pass from \$6 to \$10 per day, from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.

d. REVIEW OF OPTIONS FOR AMENDING PREFERENTIAL PARKING PROGRAM. Memorandum from Community Development Director Ken Robertson dated September 20, 2010.

Community Development Director Robertson presented the staff report and responded to Council questions. City Manager Burrell also responded to Council questions, noting that: (1) staff was asking for direction on options that would be presented as a proposed program at a future noticed public hearing; and (2) staff was still researching with other cities the issue of oversized vehicles that use more than one parking space, which would come back as a separate item at a future meeting.

<u>Action</u>: To not issue parking permits to any car with out-of-state registration unless the owner of the car is a student or in the military.

Motion Bobko, second DiVirgilio. The motion carried by a unanimous vote.

<u>Further Action</u>: To charge a one-time fee of \$54 for a driveway permit for a person to park in front of his/her driveway, with the understanding that the actual cost, including staff's cost to verify that the driveway width is adequate, will be calculated as part of the master fee study currently in progress.

Motion Bobko, second Fishman. The motion carried by a unanimous vote.

<u>Proposed Action</u>: To increase resident parking permit fees to \$120 for the first and second permit, \$240 for the third permit, \$360 for each additional permit as well as the guest pass.

Motion Bobko. The motion died for lack of a second.

<u>Proposed Action</u>: To hire a consultant to conduct a summer review of parking and determine the economic value of parking spaces to provide the City with a baseline for setting residential permit fees

Motion Fishman, second Duclos. The motion failed, noting the dissenting votes of Bobko, DiVirgilio and Mayor Tucker.

<u>Action</u>: To increase resident parking permit fees to \$100 for the first and second permit, \$200 for the third permit, and \$300 for each additional permit as well as the guest pass, and to make the purchase of day passes more accessible.

Motion DiVirgilio, second Bobko. The motion passed, noting the dissenting votes of Duclos and Fishman.

By Council consensus, staff was directed to report back on the scheduling of a public hearing for the item and to detail the proposed amendments to the Preferential Parking Program in a notice mailed to all current permits holders and well as the notice for the general public

Regular Meeting of September 28, 2010

SUBJECT: REVIEW OF OPTIONS FOR AMENDING PREFERENTIAL PARKING PROGRAM

Recommendation:

Direct staff as to whether to amend the preferential parking program with regard to permit pricing, restrictions and related program aspects, and if so, to hold a public hearing with notification to all current permit holders and the general public.

Background:

On July 27, 2010 the Council reviewed various options for refining the preferential parking program, and directed staff to return with information on the topics below. The Council's request for alternatives regarding city locations and time limits for parking oversize vehicles and related issues will be addressed as a separate agenda item.

The July 27th Minutes indicate other areas of Council agreement as to how the preferential parking district should be amended.

Analysis:

1. Provide more information on parking permits issued to vehicles with out-of-state license plates, including consideration of vehicle owners such as students or military personnel.

The Council on July 27th discussed whether vehicle permits should be issued to out of state vehicles, or whether these permits should be issued for an interim period during which the owner must obtain a California registration. If the vehicle has out of state registration the City issues the parking permit as a one time courtesy to the resident; the vehicle must be registered in California before a vehicle permit is issued in the next year. Most of these residents are new to the City and have not had the opportunity to register their vehicle in California. The out of state registration must be current and list the resident's name.

The following are exempt from the requirement to obtain a California registration:

- Military California DMV allows active military personnel to keep their vehicles registered in their home state.
- Students California DMV also allows students who are here attending school the ability to keep their vehicle registered in their home state.
- Dual Residents –City Council Resolution 83-4572 states that persons who maintain more than one household, of which one is located in the impacted area and have their vehicles registered to an address other than Hermosa Beach, may be issued permits upon furnishing an affidavit that the Hermosa Beach residence is a second residence, it is only occupied by the applicant, it is not separately rented or leased, and it is understood that no additional permits will be issued for that



unit. The DMV allows a person to keep their vehicle registered in another state if the person resides in the other state for more than 50% of the time.

In permit year 2010/11, there were 170 vehicle permits issued to out of state vehicles (3.3% of total vehicle permits issued) with 33 issued to out of state exempt vehicles (0.6% of total vehicle permits).

2010/11 figures are for permit issued for the permit year to date. The vast majority of permits have been issued for this current year. Totals may not add due to rounding.

2. Determine the cost for staff to measure a driveway and issue a driveway permit for a one-time, not annual fee for driveway permits.

On July 27th, the Council discussed requiring an annual driveway permit or maintaining the one-time permit as an incentive to increase utilization of these parking opportunities.

Driveway permits for a property occupant to park in front of his/her own driveway are currently issued for a one-time fee of \$44. The process involves driveway measuring by Community Services staff and permit issuance by Finance Department staff, consuming on average one hour at a cost of \$54.00. The full cost of issuing driveway and vehicle permits will be calculated as part of the master fee study which is in progress.

3. Provide information on a scope of work to provide the value of parking spaces.

On July 27th, the Council reviewed suggestions and the basis for increasing preferential parking permit fees, requesting a scope of work and cost to determine the value of parking resources. Preliminary scopes of work and costs for determining the economic value of parking spaces were obtained from the consulting firms of Fehr & Peers and Walker Parking. Cost ranges from \$13,500 to \$30,000.1

The scope includes review of parking inventory and utilization, parking program administration and revenue, and parking pricing recommendations. For maximum validity, the parking utilization inventory should be conducted during the summer months. The master fee study currently in progress will calculate the city's costs of issuing vehicle permits, but not the economic value.

¹ The higher figure represents work that might also support a Coastal application to re-evaluate the lower parking standard of 3/1000 in the downtown district.

4. Provide names of businesses and number of employee permits issued to each business, as the basis for discussion on whether to prohibit businesses that have required onsite parking from obtaining employee parking permits.

The attached table provides the names of businesses, number of employee permits issued, and whether onsite parking appears to be available based on general knowledge and review of aerial photos. Findings include:

- 85 businesses purchased a total of 184 employee parking permits.
- 19 (22%) purchased more than 2 permits, 10 (12%) purchased more than 3 permits (7 lack onsite parking); 2 purchased more than 10 permits (both lack onsite parking).
- 28 businesses have onsite parking, 47 businesses do not; 10 are undetermined.

No clear trends are apparent. Businesses purchasing employee permits averaged slightly more than 2 permits each, but less than 12% of businesses purchased more than 3 permits. It is noted that the number of active permits could be artificially high because an employee may be issued a permit for each vehicle driven to work, and the permit count may include employees that left the company and have been replaced.

<u>Action</u>: To direct staff to bring back a report offering alternatives for Council consideration regarding City locations and time limits allowed for parking oversized vehicles and other issues related to these larger vehicles, with input from Chief Savelli.

Motion Bobko, second Duclos. The motion carried by a unanimous vote.

<u>Proposed Action</u>: To not issue parking permits to vehicles with out-of-state license plates.

Motion Bobko. The motion was withdrawn by the maker and direction given to staff to come back with a report providing more information on this issue, including consideration of categories of vehicle owners such as students or military personnel.

<u>Action</u>: To determine the cost for staff to measure a driveway and issue a driveway permit for a one-time, not annual, fee for driveway permits.

Motion Bobko, second Tucker. The motion carried by a unanimous vote.

<u>Proposed Action</u>: To charge \$10 for a daily pass for a period of 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.

Motion Bobko. The motion was tabled by the maker until issues regarding the resident parking passes are decided.

<u>Proposed Action</u>: To direct staff to inquire with a parking consultant to develop a scope of work to provide to the City the value of a parking space. Motion Bobko, second Fishman. The motion was replaced by a substitute motion.

Proposed Substitute Action: To set the following rates for parking passes:

- (1) For impacted zone residents, \$60 per pass for up to two vehicles;
- (2) For a guest pass, \$60;
- (3) For a third resident pass, \$80;
- (4) For a fourth resident pass, \$100;
- (5) For each additional resident pass, increase price by \$20; and
- (6) Increase rates annually, using the CPI as a guide.

Motion Tucker, second Mayor DiVirgilio. The motioned failed, noting the dissenting votes of Bobko, Duclos and Fishman.

The previous motion was then considered again.

<u>Further Action</u>: To direct staff to inquire with a parking consultant to develop a scope of work to provide to the City the value of a parking space.

Motion Bobko, second Fishman. The motion carried, noting the dissenting votes of Tucker and Mayor DiVirgilio.

City Manager Burrell said he would report back on the consultant cost and scope of work, noting that the value of event and daily passes would be analyzed also. Regarding the 194 employee parking passes, he said he would report back with the names of the businesses and how many permits have been issued to each business.

<u>Final Action</u>: To direct staff to agendize a discussion for the Council to consider prohibiting businesses which have required onsite parking from obtaining employee parking permits.

Motion Tucker, second Mayor DiVirgilio. The motion carried by a unanimous vote.

The meeting recessed at 9:33 p.m.
The meeting reconvened at 9:42 p.m.

Finance Director Copeland presented the staff report and responded to Council questions.

Coming forward to address the Council on this item was:

George Barks – Hermosa Beach, thanked the Council for establishing twotier benefits which would save the City a lot of money in years to come.

SUBJECT: REVIEW OF OPTIONS FOR AMENDING PREFERENTIAL PARKING PROGRAM

Recommendation:

Direct staff regarding whether to (1) amend the Preferential Parking Program with regard to permit pricing, restrictions and/or related program aspects, and (2) if so, to hold a public hearing with notification to all current permit holders and the general public by public notice.

Background:

On April 27, 2010, the Council reviewed the history of and options for amending the Preferential Parking Program and directed staff to return with a refined list of options that may be considered. Comments and questions raised at that meeting included the following:

- Parking is a scarce commodity within the City and pricing should be examined in this light.
- The large number of parking permits that are being purchased, including those purchased by people with adequate onsite parking, indicates that permits may be priced too low.
- A parking management consultant could make recommendations on program structure and pricing.
- People are parking their vehicles on the street and retaining onsite parking for their guests.
- Due to high rents, some addresses may have 3 or 4 roommates sharing the unit.
- The rules for recreational vehicles should be reviewed relative to use of two spaces, length of time parked on the street, and safety.
- Permit prices changes should not be tied to employee MOUs.
- Some people that do not maintain Hermosa Beach as their primary residence may be obtaining vehicle permits.¹

As indicated in the April 27th Staff Report, residents within the preferential parking district may purchase one permit per registered vehicle, plus one guest permit for each legal address. In addition, owners of rental property may also purchase one guest permit per legal rental unit². The table below summarizes permit types and prices.

¹ The City issues permits for out-of-state licensed vehicles, but does not renew the permit the following year unless licensed in California. Exemptions for military personnel, students and dual residents per the Vehicle Code are allowed.

² In 1983 a resolution was adopted allowing legal owners of rental property to purchase one guest permit for each legally established dwelling unit. This allowed owner to control a guest permit in the event the tenant moves out.

Refined Preferential Parking Program Options:

Three program changes are suggested: an escalating fee structure for vehicle and guest permits, changes to other permit prices, and out-of-state license vehicle restrictions. These proposals take into account Council member discussions, parking congestion, impacts to residents and staff, and the purpose of the program to provide long-term residential parking for people impacted by beach parking while maintaining availability of public parking near the beach.

1. ESCALATING FEE STRUCTURE:

Increasing fees from \$40 to a fee that better represents the value of the permit may encourage people to use onsite parking, store or park vehicles not often used at another location, or reduce the number of cars in their household. All of the fees "suggested" in this report are for purposes of illustration; the City Council may set the permit fees as they deem appropriate.

Staff evaluated an 'escalating fee structure' where the fee would increase as the number of permits increases per address. For example, increasing the 1st and 2nd vehicle permit fee and guest permit fee to \$120 may better reflect the value gained by obtaining a permit, but still averages only \$10 per month. Even at the higher end of the scale (\$240) the fee would only be \$20 per month. It is likely that many people purchase a guest permit in lieu of a vehicle permit, so people purchasing three permits would actually pay \$120 per permit.

Representative Escalating Fee Structure proposal, per address:

This example provides an escalating fee, with no maximum on the number of permits per address.

Vehicle permit:

\$120 1st permit

\$120 2nd permit \$180 3rd permit

\$240 Each additional permit

Guest permit: \$120 (Also applies to guest permit purchased by owner of rental unit.)

It is possible that a substantial fee increase will result in spillover into areas with fewer parking restrictions, especially when the fee increase is initially instituted. However, if the fee increase has the desired effect, more on-street parking should be available and people may find the convenience of parking near their residence overrides the fee increase, especially as they become accustomed to the fee change.

Although the number of people purchasing permits may decrease, it is probable that revenues would rise. The City can evaluate program effects during the first year if it is instituted.

The escalating fee structure, with its incentive to use onsite parking, is consistent with the Coastal policies to ensure beach parking is available.

2. OVERSIZE VEHICLE PROGRAM

Most of the issues with oversize vehicles, such as the view blockage issue, are not related to the parking permit program per se and would require separate study and perhaps an amendment to the municipal code to set restrictions.

Staff does not believe that vehicles that extend into a second space is a frequent problem; however the permit process may be modified in the following manner to address the issue.

<u>Proposal</u>: Information will be provided to permit applicants that makes it clear that the parking permit (both vehicle permits and guest permits) are for one parking space only. Vehicles that add a trailer or vehicles that extend into a second space are required to pay the second meter or be in violation. In that case, they would be issued a citation.

3. OUT-OF-STATE LICENSED VEHICLE PROGRAM:

Council raised a question regarding issuance of permits to people with out-of-state registered vehicles. Occupants must show proof of residency in order to obtain vehicle permits, but vehicles need not be registered in California the first time a permit is issued. When the permit is renewed, a California registration is required. State law requires out-of-state vehicles to be registered within 20 days of establishing residency; California residents have 10 days to change their vehicle address, but the Department of Motor Vehicles does not issue a new registration reflecting the change. The city's current program does not affect any State requirements relative to change of registration, and staff does not believe any change to the program is needed.

4. DRIVEWAY PERMITS:

Currently, 512 driveway permits have been issued within the preferential parking district, allowing the occupants of a property to park in front of the driveway for a one-time fee of \$44. The program has been in effect since 1984. Due to the one-time fee it is unknown how many of these permits are still being used. The Council should consider an annually renewable permit. The fee should be no higher than the vehicle parking permit fee to encourage people to obtain these permits rather than vehicle permits.

Driveway Permit proposal:

Change the driveway permit to an annually renewable permit, such as \$60, to incentivize occupants to use this space. Notify all driveway permit holders of this change and advertise the program citywide.

5. EVENT PERMITS:

Event permits may be purchased by permit holders five times per year, with a maximum of 20 permits purchased each time; permits 1-5 are \$1 each, and permits 6-20 are free. This allows 100 permits with a total revenue of \$25 to be purchased per address. There were 5,888 event permits issued in FY 2009/10. Since the fee is low or zero, in some cases people may be obtaining more permits than needed for their guests. This represents a loss in potential revenues. An increase in the fee would continue to provide relief from metered rates and the need to monitor and feed the meter throughout the day.

Event Permit proposal:

Increase the event permit to \$3 each for event permits 1-5, and \$5 each for permits 6-20.

6. DAILY PASSES:

An unlimited number of daily passes may be issued. The \$6.00 fee allows parking from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. for a flat rate. Since enforcement now begins at 10:00 a.m., the metered rate for this timeframe would be \$8.75.. Increasing the daily pass to or near the meter rates would still confer a benefit by eliminating the need to monitor and feed the meter throughout the day.

Daily Pass proposal:

Increase the daily pass fee to \$8.00.

7. PERMIT FEES GENERALLY

The Council suggested that parking fees should not be tied to the Memoranda of Understanding between the City and its collective bargaining groups. The City's Master Fee Resolution allows city fees (including for parking permits) to be administratively adjusted annually based on the average negotiated changes in salaries/benefits contained in the Memoranda of Understanding between the City and its collective bargaining groups for each current fiscal year. The reason this method was chosen over the general CPI is because salaries/benefits comprise 70% of city costs; therefore this method better reflects the annual increase to city costs.

Since the City has already budgeted funds to do a new user fee study, this methodology can be reassessed at that time.

There is no requirement that people purchase parking permits. The fees proposed continue to be extremely low compared to the cost of metered parking, and provide relief from time restrictions imposed within the preferential parking district. The suggested fees also incentivize use of onsite parking when available and move in the direction of pricing as a reflection of demand.

Fiscal Impact:

The preferential parking program generates revenues based on number of permits and fee schedule. Revenue for FY 2009/10 is presented below:

Revenues from 9,597 vehicle and guest permits sold in Permit Year 2009/10 (\$40) was \$383,880. Only 3,199 vehicle and guest permits (at \$120) would need to be sold to generate the same revenues. Thus, the number of permits purchased would need to be reduced by more than 2/3 to create a net loss of revenues.

Summary:

The recommendation to increase fees in this report seeks to price parking more in line with its actual value, while remaining far below the cost of metered parking and providing convenience for property owners in the impacts area. As stated earlier, the proposals below are for purposes of illustration; the City Council may set the parking fees as they deem appropriate, subject to any required review by the Coastal Commission.

SUBJECT: REVIEW OF OPTIONS FOR AMENDING PREFERENTIAL PARKING PROGRAM

Recommendation:

Direct staff as to whether to amend the preferential parking program with regard to permit pricing, restrictions and related program aspects, and if so, to hold a public hearing with notification to all current permit holders and the general public.

Background:

On October 13, 2009, the Council directed staff to return with a report indicating the total number of parking spaces in the preferential parking area, provide suggestions for determining the number of parking spaces on each property, and provide a history of the current program. Concerns expressed by two residents to the Council focused on parking congestion due to readily and affordable access to parking permits within the preferential parking area and their use by recreational vehicles.

Staff is seeking direction regarding whether the Council desires to consider amending the preferential parking program. If so, staff recommends holding a public hearing with notification to all current permit holders.

History:

The preferential parking program operates under Coastal Development Permit No. 5-82-251 issued in 1982, and as amended. It provides a permit parking zone (Attachment 1) for long-term residential parking for persons living near the beach and impacted by beach parking, while maintaining availability of public parking near the beach and free remote parking. The reasons for establishing the program are more fully explained in Attachment 3.

The Coastal Development Permit requires the City to maintain a minimum of 1,100 metered parking spaces within 2 blocks of the beach (yellow meters) that allow parking for no less than 6 hours. The current rate is \$1.25 per hour. As a condition of the Preferential Parking Program, the city must provide at least 396 weekend/holiday and 320 weekday free long-term (6-12 hr.) remote public parking spaces as indicated in Attachment 4 during the hours of enforcement of the preferential parking (10 a.m.-12 midnight) on city streets and in city owned lots within 8 blocks of the beach.

Preferential parking program permits and fees:

Within the preferential parking district, residents and employees may purchase permits to park at 12-hour yellow meters (1204 meters¹) or in one-hour zones within residential areas.² Residents within the district

² Vehicles are prohibited from parking on the public street for more than 72 hours in the same space per H.B.M.C. Sections 10.12.150(K) and 10.32.120, and California Vehicle Code Section 22651(K).



¹ Community Services indicates 1204 yellow post parking meters are the primary preferential parking meter spaces. These parking meters comprise the majority of the spaces along Hermosa Avenue (including the island) and a large section of the residential area that borders Hermosa Avenue to the west, Monterey to the east, Herondo to the south, and 10th Street to the north. The yellow post preferential meter continue through the north end from 14th Street to the city limits at Neptune from the unit block through the 100 blocks. The only street on the north end without preferential parking meters is the 100 block of 19th Street (possibly due to steepness of the grade).

may purchase one permit for each vehicle registered to them, plus one guest permit for each legal address (\$40 each), regardless whether off-street parking is available at the address. In addition, owners of rental property may purchase one guest permit per rental unit, to provide the owner control of the permit should the tenant move during the permit year. Over the life of the program, the vehicle and guest permit fee has been increased from \$10 in 1982, to \$40 on September 1, 2008. Employees within the area may purchase one employee permit per year (\$143); the price of these permits was increased from \$66 in May 2007. The price of parking permits changes in relation to the average negotiated changes in salaries/benefits contained in the Memoranda of Understanding between the City and its collective bargaining groups for the current fiscal year.

Permit holders may also purchase event parking permits five times per year for up to 20 vehicles, at \$1 per permit for 1-5 permits, while permits 6-20 are free. Visitors may also purchase daily passes for \$6 to park from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. at yellow meters and in one-hour zones. A \$44 driveway parking permit issued one-time to the occupant may also be obtained allowing residents to park on the public street in front of their own driveway.

Number of permits issued, parking spaces and revenues:

In permit year 2009/10 over 9,500 preferential parking permits were issued: 54% were vehicle permits and 44% were guest permits.

As of April 2010, there were 2,481 parking spaces within the preferential parking district as shown in Table 3. The degree to which guest permits are used primarily by the occupants of a residence is unknown, since guest permits are comparable to vehicle permits in terms of time and location of their use.

² Vehicles are prohibited from parking on the public street for more than 72 hours in the same space per H.B.M.C. Sections 10.12.150(K) and 10.32.120, and California Vehicle Code Section 22651(K).

Relationship of number of permits issued to addresses:

Table 5 shows that 5,180 'vehicle permits' were issued to 3,070 addresses during the permit year 2009/10. This table does not include 4,223 guest and 194 employee permits. Some addresses with a significant number of permits contain multi-family units. Of note:

- 1724 addresses were issued 1 vehicle permit (33% of vehicle permits issued).
- 856 addresses were issued 2 vehicle permits (33% of total vehicle permits issued).
- 490 addresses were issued 3 or more vehicle permits (1744 vehicle permits, 34% of total permits).

Based on the above figures, restricting each address (3,070 addresses) to one vehicle permit would result in 2,110 fewer vehicle permits, a 41% reduction in vehicle permits (\$84,400 reduction in revenue). Overall, the total number of permits issued (9,597 permits) would be reduced by about 22%. Restricting addresses that purchased more than two vehicle permits (490 addresses) to two vehicle permits would

^{*} Includes 3 disabled spaces.

result in 764 fewer vehicle permits, a 15% reduction in vehicle permits (\$59,100 reduction in revenue).³ These scenarios assume the number of guest permits remains constant.

Relationship of off-street parking spaces to number of permits issued:

The correspondence from two residents to the City Council on October 13th suggested that parking would be less congested if onsite parking was utilized. Staff conducted a sample survey as indicated in Table 6, finding no clear relationship between off-street spaces and number of permits purchased. For single-family units, two permits is the most prevalent number purchased regardless of number of off-street parking spaces. In performing the survey, staff did not attempt to determine whether garages were being used for parking or for other purposes.

As older housing units are redeveloped with the required three parking spaces, it is possible that the need for on-street parking may decrease. Restricting the number of permits based on off-street parking would require the Community Development Department to conduct a field inspection of each address when a permit is requested. Such a program could be burdensome and cause delays in issuing parking permits. Workload could decrease in future years as parking is determined for various addresses.

Parking programs of other cities:

Preferential parking programs for several other beach cities are compared in Table 7. In terms of limiting impacts of the program on parking availability, Laguna Beach is most restrictive, allowing a maximum of two permits per residence at \$200 per permit. Long Beach allows a maximum of three resident permits, and charges a higher fee for a 3rd permit or guest permit than for the 1st and 2nd permits.

Preferential Parking Program Options:

The impetus for Council's discussion of this issue was concerns expressed by two residents relating to parking congestion due to readily and affordable access to parking permits within the preferential parking area and their use by recreational vehicles. The preferential parking program, intended to provide persons living in impacted areas near the beach opportunities to find adequate parking near their residence, has existed in essentially its current format for over 25 years, and any changes will have both positive and negative impacts to on-street parking and residents. As an aside, measures that constrict parking have been shown to be effective in getting people to choose other modes of travel that are more sustainable.

Staff has summarized various options in Table 8; many of these options can be combined. Unless significant changes to the program are made, any single or combination of measures is likely to have only modest effects on reducing on-street congestion.

Substantially higher fees or a cap on number of permits may cause some people to use onsite spaces if available and free up spaces on the street. These options may disproportionately affect people without onsite parking, instances where multiple people at one address each have one vehicle, or typically renters with lower incomes.

Restricting the total number of permits may free up on-street spaces, but would be less convenient and more costly for residents who lack onsite parking.

Restricting the number of permits based on onsite parking availability is viewed by staff as overly burdensome, requiring the Community Development Department to conduct a field inspection and make interpretations regarding garage and uncovered parking for each address when a permit is requested, and causing delays for parking permit applicants. People with driveways serving two car garages also have the option to obtain a permit to park on the street in front of their driveway.

Other options include creating several preferential parking zones, and restricting parking to the zone closest to the residence to prevent people from using the parking permit to park downtown, for purely entertainment reasons for example. Restricting preferential parking at yellow meter spaces to less than 72 hours would be less convenient but increase space turnover.

Regarding parking of recreational vehicles, the Police Department recommends amending the parking program by stating a restriction of one space per permit, and banning the parking of oversize vehicles or restricting where they can park. Oversize vehicles consume two spaces, impede sight distance, and may impede flow of traffic when not well-parked.

Fiscal Impact:

As noted above, the preferential parking program generates revenues based on number of permits and fee schedule. Projections for 2009/10 are as follows:

Revenue increases associated with options 1-3 would depend on the specific program amendments. A significant price increase may result in fewer permits. Conversely, revenues from metered spaces and tickets at metered and unmetered spaces (minimum \$50 per ticket) could, to an unknown degree, offset reduced program revenues. Option 4 would increase staff costs to conduct field investigations to verify and track number of onsite parking spaces. Arguably, options 5-7 would have limited impact on revenues or costs.

Summary:

The preferential parking program remains essentially the same since its inception in 1982. Various options are presented to address parking congestion and use of recreational vehicles. While restrictions on number of permits issued (options 3 and 4) may reduce revenues from the parking program, revenues from metered parking and ticketing at metered and unmetered space could, to an unknown degree, offset reduced program revenues. Staff believes changes to address parking of recreational vehicles (option 6) are warranted at this time. Conversely, option 4 is likely to be burdensome for staff and residents desiring to purchase permits.

Any change to the program will likely generate a lot of reaction and testimony from residents in the district, and should only be implemented after a fully noticed public hearing, potentially warranting a special meeting.

Greg Maffei – Hermosa Beach, said he lived in the impacted area and said he was lucky to look for 30 minutes to find a space four blocks from his house and it was especially difficult since he has young children; said during the day in the summer, he tried not to move his car at all; felt the low cost of parking passes was contributing to the problem; said he would be happy to help, maybe verifying how many cars and on-property parking spaces residents had.

<u>Action</u>: To direct staff to return with a report indicating the total number of parking spaces in the impacted area, provide suggestions for determining how many parking spaces on each property and provide a history of the current program.

Motion Mayor Bobko, second Reviczky. The motion carried, noting the absence of DiVirgilio.

Dear City Council members:

Since I will be out of the country next week for the parking Public Hearing, I thought I would send you a quick note to get my two cents in....afterall, I pretty much started this whole thing!

Parking in the so-called impacted area (west of Loma and south of 8th street) has reached a crisis point. On most nights after 6:00 pm and on weekends (especially during the summer), it is often impossible to find a convenient parking spot. Residents who require street parking frequently have to waste time and gas driving in circles or resort to parking illegally and risking a ticket. In basic economic terms, demand for street parking far exceeds the supply of available spaces. Since there is not much we can do about the supply, we need to find ways to attack the demand.

Currently, it is legitimate for property owners in the impacted area to get one window permit for each vehicle registered to the property plus one guest permit for each property. Given the relatively low cost for these permits (\$40), many property owners (including myself) get as many permits as they are eligible for. This easy access to permits has unfortunately allowed property owners to convert their garages to workshops, play spaces, and illegal apartments. It is also allows property owners to park on the street during busy periods to reserve garage spaces for their guests. This doesn't sound that egregious except that residents who need these spaces often cannot get them. It is a clear case of "gaming the system." It doesn't violate the letter of the law but it clearly violates the spirit and ultimately it artificially increases demand.

I do not believe that raising the permit prices alone will solve the problem. However, I do think it is a logical first step and will make people who don't actually NEED the permits to think twice about getting them. In other words, it might help reduce demand. I think it is critically important for members of the community to understand that the Council is not increasing fees to increase revenue. Rather it is increasing fees to try to instigate a change in behavior. There are those who may argue that \$300 for a guest permit is steep.

But \$300 for the right to park close to the beach 24/7/365 is truly a bargain! If you don't agree then let your guests find and pay for their own parking! Similarly, \$100 for the right for residents to park on the street in this neighborhood for an entire year is a bargain!

In the long- term, we need to find other ways to reduce demand. One way to do this is to not allow residents who have legal off-street spaces to get permits for the vehicles that should be parked in them. In other words, if you have two legal garage spaces, then you should not be

allowed permits for the first two vehicles registered to the property. This will require time and money on the front-end to verify the number of legal off-street spaces on each property in the impacted area.

However, after the initial expense, this will reduce the number of permits issued and permanently reduce demand. (This is turn poses a problem for reduced revenue for the city which will be compensated for by the increase in cost per permit.)

As far as employee parking, I do not see any reason whatsoever that local business employees need permits to park in the impacted area. The area is almost exclusively residential. Why not put a program in place to encourage local employees to park in the city lots or city parking structure? (Or simply make it a different type of permit.) These facilities are typically under-utilized during normal business hours. Evening employees of downtown bars and restaurants should prefer to be close to downtown anyway. This will have the desired effect of further reducing demand in the impacted area.

On a separate but related note, the Council's plan to allow RV's to continue to park in the impacted area as long as they have one permit for each parking space they use is ludicrous! RV's should simply not be allowed to park on the street in this area. Period. They are dangerous (block pedestrian and driver sightlines), unsightly, take up valuable overnight parking spots needed by residents, and simply do not belong here. They belong in appropriate long-term parking areas or on private property.

I look forward to hearing the results of the Public Hearing.

My fiancé, Noelle Leonard, and I would like to comment about the proposed changes to raise Hermosa Beach parking permit fees. We will not be able to attend the January 11th meeting, so we request that this email be included in the record of responses and comments.

Frankly speaking, we think that this fee hike is absolutely ridiculous – I was actually dumbfounded when I read the notification card that come in the mail. We are homeowners here and pay sizeable property tax – this enormous increase is essentially a property tax hike, as we have no choice but to purchase parking passes and pay whatever fee that is established by you. But understand, we consider it our right as tax-paying homeowners to pay a reasonable price for a parking pass, and \$40 is reasonable (having lived in Hermosa Beach for my entire adult life, I've watched the price steadily creep upwards and I actually think \$40 is a bit expensive, but it's acceptable).

It's one thing to raise fees a small amount, but to raise them this much is financially painful, to say the least. You are talking about increasing our fees from approx. \$120 to \$500....that's 416% in one year!!!! That just doesn't happen in normal life. And for us to have to pay \$300 for a guest parking pass which we only use sparingly, it'll be cheaper to feed a meter with quarters. In fact, it may be cheaper for us to do that anyway, so you may end up actually losing revenue from us if you choose to pursue this course.

We urge you to find other ways to increase the revenue base, as this is the only possible explanation for such an outrageous fee hike. If this fee hike is passed, Noelle and I will find ways to not spend money in our own town as both a means of offsetting money spent on parking passes and as a way of ensuring we make our own negative impact on City of Hermosa Beach tax revenue, and I'd bet others will do the same. \$300 is way too expensive for the guest parking pass. I think we all realize that Hermosa Beach is not the easiest place to get to - it is not that close to any of the freeway entrances/exits and the surrounding surface streets can be quite busy. With that said, the first permit should be relatively cheap. We have to accept that families have a lot more cars than when a lot of the housing was built in Hermosa. Assuming that the average family can park two cars at the house (and that each parent has his or her own car), one permit is needed for a high schooler or college student's car.

But the \$100 is too expensive - I think it should be \$60, which is \$5 per month.

Secondly, I think the guest pass should also be \$60 since a guest pass doesn't have to be used by a guest, it can also be used by a resident in lieu of buying a second resident permit (or even buying a first resident permit). The great thing about the guest passes are their flexibility. I would rather have a guest pass than any resident pass because with a guest pass I can park on the street and have my guest park in my space in the garage or if their car won't fit (which is over 50% of the cars on the road), I give my pass to the guest and continue to park in the garage.

I think the second permit should be \$120, the third \$240, and \$300 for every resident permit after that.

In regards to Item 2, I completely agree with not issuing parking permits to out-of-state registrations though I think the proposal should go further and NOT exempt students. What student from Hermosa could possibly have out-of-state registration and be driving back to Hermosa so often that he or she needs a resident parking pass? Again, this points to keeping the guest pass at a lower rate because its flexibility covers more than just guests coming down for a day. The military exemption makes sense.

I have no comment on Item 3 since it does not affect me.

I do not agree with the increase in the daily passes since this discourages guests from coming to visit. As I mentioned before, guests spend money in Hermosa - as a City we should be encouraging that and raising the rate to \$10 is just too high.

I think the employee permit fee should remain at \$143.

Besides the items discussed, I think the City Council should look into replacing the current parking meters with ones that accept credit cards. The ones in Los Angeles work great and eliminate the need to carry a bunch of change around in the off chance you decide to park on the street. It would also encourage people to stay longer since guests would not have to scramble to find change if they wanted to stay longer.

Finally, I think the City should discuss with the residents that street parking is really meant for guests, not for residents, since guests don't have homes to park their cars at. Our City is so dependent on City's gross sales receipt tax that it should be looking for ways to get more guests to come and spend money in the City.

Dear City Council,

My name is Ted Davis and I have owned the 10 unit apt. building located at 1702 Hermosa Ave. for 10 years. My building was built in the time when only one (1) parking space was required for each apt. However, any of my apartments can house two adults with two (2) cars, and generally do. When this occurs the only solution is for the 2nd tenant to obtain a permit for \$40, which up to now they have done.

Relative to # 1 on the notice sent out to residents, you have to realize that in these tough economical times, even that extra \$10/month for a tenant struggling to make ends meet is a burden. When I raised this issue to your staff, the answer was that maybe the landlord should have to shoulder the burden of this new tax, and make no mistake about it, this is a tax, pure and simple. For me to assume this burden, you would now be assessing me up to \$1000/year for these permits, in addition to the exhorbitant property taxes and the newly revised business license fees that were recently imposed. I know there's a parking problem, but to impose the burden on those who operate rental properties for their retirement income, is an unfair and discriminatory practice, in that the burden of the increased permit fee falls squarely on the shoulders of the businesses and income property owners' of Hermosa.

Regarding point # 2, I'm not aware of how long an out of state visitor can operate an auto, before his outof-state registration would be revoked. According to staff, the time limit is 10 days. I'm pretty sure that
that's an inaccurate statement, and I take exception to not being willing to issue a parking permit to a nonresident just because they haven't yet had the time to change their registration. This refusal to issue a
permit under these circumstances definitely affects the landlord's ability to rent an apartment. "You can
rent the apartment, but first you must change your car registration to this state." Are we kidding? Are we
now acting as enforcers for the DMV. Each of my apartments is entitled to 1 space, parking on the street,
whether he has a valid Ca. registration or not. As long as he/she is a resident of 1702 Hermosa Ave, and
the garage for that unit is already occupied by the other tenant in the same unit, the 2nd tenant is entitled
to a parking space on the street, in accordance with your own ordinances.

Relative to point #3, why is there even a fee to park in front of my own garage, as long as I'm not blocking the sidewalk. I've never heard of such a requirement. This is simply a revenuer for the City, and has no merit as a type of parking fee. It's in front of my property and is harming or inconveniencing no one. I'm not taking anyone else's spot, as no one else would be allowed to block my driveway.

Point # 4 talks to daily passes, and I have no problem with this increase.

Point # 5, I also have no issue, although, I suspect other retail businesses will.

In summary, your proposed increases clearly place the majority of the burden on the income property owners and the businesses. The impact to residential owners is minimal and therefore this proposal is unfair and discriminatory. I've written this letter as I'm out of town until the night of the 11th, so I will be unable to attend your meeting that night. I'm told by staff that this meeting is a discussion and that no action will actually be taken as far as increasing rates without more public testimony and further consideration. If this is incorrect, I would ask that someone be directed to contact me on my cell number, provided below. If there is a possibility of these increases actually coming to fruition on the 11th, I wish to have the opportunity to direct my agent/representative to appear on my behalf.

The proposed increases are just too much. One parking permit will go up 150%! Guest permits will go up 650%!!!!!!!

Annual fee increases are to be expected, as the cost of living increases. But these percentages are unbelievable.

A more reasonable increase must be proposed. What if you tried to raise other city services by that much - can you imagine getting a water bill for 150% more?

Think about it - this is insane.

The increase to the driveway permit fee (25%) seems more realistic.

I understand that city governments everywhere are trying to find new revenue streams. But raising the permits costs by such egregious amounts is not going to help. I am assuming that is the goal, unless this is some misguided attempt to free up more residential parking. The same amount of people will be living here, and will need the same amount of cars. Just a comment about cost. Even at \$300 per permit, someone who uses it all the time (a business or residence without on site parking) is still getting a deal. Downtown parking in most cities will run \$5 to \$15 per day. For a business (or rather their employees) that works our to \$1300 per year minimum (\$5 x 5 days x 52 weeks). And of course, many businesses are open 7 days per week and would be using the permit 365 days per year. This also applies to a resident without on site parking. Maybe some people will decide to clean out their garages and use them for their cars.

I would like to reiterate that I hope the Council adopts a rate structure that makes the cost for the first couple of permits, whether permanent or guest, closer to \$40 rather than \$300.

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And finally, I must also disagree. The Council is trying to get people to change their habits by charging a high price for not changing. In my mind, that's definitely about the money.

I would like the Council to consider a lower cost for residential guest parking permits. I would propose they be put on the same graduated cost scale as the resident permits (i.e., first 2 at \$100, 3rd at \$200, and 4th and more at \$300). Alternatively, they could be integrated with the resident permits and costed as the last issued permit (i.e., 2 resident permits {\$100 each for first two} + 1 guest permit {3rd permit at \$200} would cost \$400).

Also, why are you not considering charging more for employee permits (your notice says it "may also be discussed"). \$143 is a great deal! This is \$0.55/day for a full time employee (5 days per week for 52 weeks per year). It should be higher, particularly considering current meter rates and your proposal for residents to pay \$300 each for more than 3 resident permits and guest permits. I would propose that the same graduated scale be used for both residential and employee permits.

An overall parking fee plan should be developed and approved, not just parts of it.

Thank you for your time and consideration of these alternate proposals.

Dear Councilmembers,

Over the past year I have seen occasional articles about raising the price of Hermosa Beach parking permits to reflect their "worth".

The parking permits are a necessity in our neighborhood for anyone who ever has guests or can't fit both cars in the garage, because of the number of people that park on our streets from outside the neighborhood. As you know these are high-density areas, many residences don't have parkable driveways, and they see a tremendous amount of additional traffic from outside during the summer months.

Please consider other cities that have neighborhoods with parking problems caused by non-residents using the streets. Santa Monica for one (I know several people who live on permit-parking streets there) which charges \$15 per permit. Of course they could charge more, but it's not about their "worth" or privilege or making money, it's about residents being able to park on the streets of their own neighborhood. I have serious issue with the proposed parking permit increase recently discussed by Council. I currently have one pass that is permanently affixed to my car, rather than a "hanger" for the rear view mirror. I have been a property owner and City resident since 2000. To go from \$40 dollars to \$100, 120 or more for a single permit is nothing more than a way to make money for the City. I am 60 years old and retired, on a fixed income. I cannot work "overtime" at a job, or as a business owner, increase prices to pay for an increase in parking permits. As I live alone, having two permits for \$100 makes no sense to me. While I have no problem with a progressive increase as you have done in the past and make the permits \$50 dollars each, a 200% increase is far greater than inflation or the cost of living.

Maybe you should have a two tiered system where residents pay one price and businesses and their associated employees pay another.

Whenever the Council has hearings on this, I will certainly make my opinions known.

Have any of you considered Hermosa's housing stock west of the highway? We still have houses from the early 1900's with no garages or access for parking. Some are on split lots and are landlocked. Even the ones in the late 1930's to 1950's may have only one parking space, or a garage that would only hold one car.

The apartment house on 4th and Hermosa Avenue has 8 units and 0 parking. Many older buildings still have bootleg apartments. There are residents who will be unfairly burdened by your new fees.

In the early 1970's, we went through an exercise with the building inspectors checking how the garages were used, only to find out it was illegal to search. Today, the use of garages as storage still exacerbates our problems. I have no use for the neighbors who do that...any more than you do. I doubt a price increase will affect them at all since many have newer homes and money is evidently not a problem. Most seem to have three or four cars, some with more cars then residents. Then there are the ones who have built exercise rooms, saunas, etc., into the front part of a four car garage leaving one space for each of two units. They will not care either. The construction was not done with a permit!

Our condos have 2 spaces per unit and the insurance, CC&R's, and H/O rules prohibit using the parking spaces for storage. We do have 2 guest spaces, not allowed for residents use. With 4 units that often necessitates a street parking permit for a guest. We all have them, but may not use them sufficiently to warrant a big increase in the cost. I for one, probably use mine once or twice a year unless a workman needs to use it for a bigger truck.

I would ask that you rethink the cost for some of these permits. Perhaps verify that some do not have any access on private property. A nominal increase for the guest permit, but not a doubling or tripling, could be justified. Inflation over the years hits all of us.

Hi Ted-

I spoke to you yesterday and indicated I thought the time to re-register vehicles was about 10 days. In checking the DMV website, the time is 20 days and there are exceptions that the city would honor. The Council did discuss whether to issue a temporary permit. The Council's reasoning was that the city should not issue a year long permit for vehicles that are not properly registered, and given the short time to register it does not make sense for the city to create and enforce another type of permit. However, it appears not to be all that straight forward, which can create its own administrative problems. http://dmv.ca.gov/pubs/brochures/howto/htvr9.htm#feesdue

The driveway permit fee covers the cost of staff measuring the space and issuing the permit. The reason for a permit is that it is illegal to park on the street blocking a driveway. Hence the permit so the person is not ticketed. It is a lifetime permit.

I would note that I did <u>not</u> say the landlord should shoulder the burden of the 'new tax'. I indicated the landlord could take this into account when setting rents, deposits, etc. (As a landlord myself I get what you are saying however.)

I am sure the Council will find your perspective helpful.

I realize the city is short of funds. One of the major reasons is our overlarge police force, necessitated by the downtown bar scene. There is little benefit to the residen ts, who rarely see a patrol car. All of the cops are downtown controlling the drunks, and benefiting the bars.

I suggest an annual entertainment license with a substantial fee plus a % of gross sales or larger fee per drink for the bars. This would give you much better control of the bars plus the money toward the cost of policing the bar scene. The excuse given in the past re the Comedy & Magic Club is hard to swallow when you consider all of the clubs and bars in Redondo, including new ones, which seem to operate under this system. It is past time for our City Council to work for the residents and stop worrying about the bar owners.

OPPOSE RESIDENTIAL PARKING PERMIT FEE INCREASES - LETTER ATTACHED

TO: City Council Members, Hermosa Beach

My husband and I are long-time residents of Hermosa Beach, living at 1221 Sunset Drive. We are unable to attend the City Council meeting on Tuesday, January 11, because we both have night classes at school that night. However, even though we can't be there in person, we want to protest in the strongest possible way the proposed increases in the resident parking fees. Stated as clearly as we can: WE ARE OPPOSED TO THE PROPOSED INCREASES IN RESIDENTIAL PARKING PERMIT FEES.

We understand that the City of Hermosa Beach is in financial difficulties, and is probably looking for any way to raise money that it can. However, raising residential parking permit fees unfairly puts this burden on only those residents who live in the "restricted" parking areas. (We are not sure of the technical term for this, but we mean the areas that have meters and/or have street parking limited to a few hours.) If the City needs to raise money, it should raise money in ways which share the burden among ALL residents, not just some of them.

Furthermore, we believe that, if the City doesn't want to consider some non-vehicle-based fee applied uniformly to all residents, it should instead consider:

- (1) More enforcement of laws such as speeding, or running through crosswalks when pedestrians are in them. Cars routinely go too fast up and down Pier Avenue, and along other big streets such as Monterey and PCH. And, although the situation has gotten somewhat better with the new crosswalks on Pier Avenue, cars still often go right through crosswalks, ignoring pedestrians. Better enforcement would both make things safer and raise money from the ticket fines.
- (2) Better enforcement and/or raising fees for parking tickets, including parking where prohibited by the red lines edging the streets, parking opposite garages on alleys, parking during street sweeping (usually only enforced during the first few minutes of the four hours), etc. Many residents in the impacted areas don't have a choice about parking on the street, but everyone does have a choice of whether to park legally or not.

In conclusion, please find ways to raise money which do not place the burden unfairly on only those residents who live in the "restricted" areas. PLEASE DO NOT RAISE THE RESIDENTIAL PARKING PERMIT FEES.

Dear City Council:

We hereby protest the suggested fee increases for resident parking permits.

We understand that city revenues have dropped and you need to raise funds wherever you can. We can empathize. Our family income, which is based on self-employment, has dropped precipitously since the beginning of the recession.

We believe that the proposed fees are excessive. While the increase from \$40 to \$100 for the first permit seems steep, we would reluctantly pay it. The \$300 fee for the guest pass, however, is outrageous. We keep a guest pass for occasional use by visitors. Perhaps twice a year, we lend it to out-of-town guests who spend the night. This past year, we have lent it to a friend who feeds our cats, waters our plants and sometimes spends the night when we travel to Arizona to deal with pressing family issues.

We understand that some residents may use the guest pass as a permanent parking permit, but we believe that most households use the guest pass as it is intended — for sometime visitors. The guest pass is convenient. We don't mind paying a small increase to have one. But if you charge \$300, we will consider the alternative of daily passes, hoarding quarters or paying parking tickets to save money.

As for the price hikes on additional permits, we were surprised to learn that the city is issuing multiple permits to households. We may be mistaken, but when we moved to Hermosa Beach in 1986, we seem to recall that the city imposed a limit of two permits plus one guest pass per household. No wonder parking at the beach is getting tougher, apart from new dwellings with driveways that take away existing parking spaces. We suggest a reduction of standard permits to two per household. Yes, this move would seem to eliminate a significant source of revenue, but surely you could make up the difference with your efficient parking enforcement team.

As longtime residents, we urge you to reconsider the proposed fees Tuesday.

It appears from the summary the changes are strictly financial in nature...significant increases in the current rates. Is this the case? The only changes are financial? I do have a couple of comments on the proposed changes. If, as I suspect, the changes are being considered to raise more money from the Preferential Parking program, can you provide me with the financial analysis of the expected revenue increase? Have you considered how many people view the pass not as a necessity, but rather a convenience and will opt out of the program altogether or reduce the number of permits they get? Have you considered how many people will not renew their permits and park in the adjacent streets where the permits are not required?

In addition, the permits are not required on the east side of Morningside(1/2 block from me) and I suspect many of my neighbors will park there rather than in front of their house causing further parking congestion in those areas...ultimately resulting in expanded restricted parking areas and frustration from Hermosa Beach residents who don't think they will impacted by this.

Today I received the notice of hearing on January 11, 2011 with regards to changes proposed to the Preferential Parking Program and wish to add my comments.

- 1) The change in fees is excessive, to the point of being offensive to the Residents of Hermosa Beach.
- 2) Parking permits are designed to provide 'Preferential Parking' to Hermosa Beach residents, particularly at meters with 'yellow' posts. However, these yellow meters represent a very small portion of the total meters available in Hermosa Beach, and despite already paying a \$40 fee for 'preferential parking', quite often there is no such thing especially in the summer months.
- 3) IF despite all wisdom that should dictate otherwise the City decides to increase the preferential parking fee by ANY amount, then the City should also paint EVERY parking meter in Hermosa beach <u>yellow</u>, and in fact REMOVE some of the unnecessary red zones in favor of more parking (example 15th st above PCH) so as to give ALL permit-paying residents a fair opportunity to find a 'FREE' parking space that has already been paid for in advance through the purchase of a 'Preferential Parking' permit. This needs to include ALL meters on the newly developed Pier Ave strip, and the re-painting of existing yellow meters that have faded and discolored so much, that both residents and parking enforcement alike have difficulty in distinguishing whether the meter is actually yellow.
- 4) Residents who pay for any parking permit should not even have to think about paying a penny more for parking anywhere in the City of Hermosa beach. Achieve this, and you MAY see acceptance in some type of price hike. But \$100, \$200 and \$300 is just ridiculous. Especially when you're asking for this money from hard-working residents who barely made it through the global financial crisis, and parents who may have 2 or more children of driving age each with a vehicle living at the same address.

Not a very well thought out program in my opinion.

My wife and I would like to share our thoughts for you to consider when making changes to the Preferential Parking program. We will comment on the five issues listed on the yellow postcard you mailed to residents.

- 1. The resident parking permits fee increases are too severe. As a compromise, we can understand a slight increase from \$40 to maybe \$50, but \$100 is a 150% increase! Second, third, and additional permits could be successively slightly more expensive.
- 2. We agree with the proposal to not issue parking permits to out-of-state vehicles unless the vehicles are owned by students or military personnel.
- 3. We agree with increasing the driveway permit fee from \$44 to \$54 as a one-time fee.
- 4. We would like a compromise on the daily pass fee from \$6 to \$8 (not \$10).

Comments:

I wish to register my unequivocal opposition to the outrageous 250% increase in resident parking permits that is being considered by our City Council.

I teach in a private university that raised my salary 4% on January, 2011. And now I hear that the City Council is considering jacking up my parking permit from \$40 to \$100 for a first permit?! 5-10%? Fine. Even 20% would be OK.

250%?! C'mon! Please don't do this to us.

We live in a small 750 sq ft. beach cottage that we have intentionally not developed into condominiums (with underground parking) like others on our block, in order to maintain a

simple lifestyle. This means that I park at least one car on Cypress Ave. daily, under the preferential parking program.

I assume this is a well intentioned attempt to find some revenue during times that are tough for all of us. I understand that. In this case, however, please do not try to solve Hermosa's fiscal woes on the backs of the city's resident tax-payers.

Hermosa families like ours place little strain on our top-rate city services (I can't remember the last time I called HBPD or HBFD, though I am eminently thankful they are there!). But we continue to pay taxes toward such services. And that is certainly legitimate, within reason.

Out-of-towners, in contrast, place significant demands on our infrastructure, and on our police department, in particular. By way of illustration, there was no police presence on Cypress Street on New Year's Eve. There didn't need to be. The downtown plaza was another story. Even on this relatively uneventful night ('only' seven arrests, according to the Beach Reporter), it was quite clear that visitors—not residents—constituted the primary drain upon city services. And not just the HBPD. City workers were sand-blasting what I assume was food, drink, and vomit off the plaza walkway just a couple days after the holiday.

Hermosa needs more money? Don't we all! Let's either learn to live on what we have, or arrange things so that non-residents foot more of the bill. I would favor doubling the fee for a parking ticket, or raising the rates in the public parking structures, before I'd stick the city's residents with an outrageous 250% increase in their preferential parking permits.

Good day. I recently received your parking permit rate increase notice. First of all, I would like to understand what is the goal of the increase.

1. Is it to generate additional revenue?

2. Is it to reduce the number of parking permits to allow for greater ease of parking?

Secondly, I find that there is a huge inequity in the community. As a homeowner, I am assessed over \$10k per year in property taxes. I live alone and own one car. However, many of the rentals around me that occupy greater space and house over 8 tenants are in total assessed the same amount. Therefore, I am already contributing more to the community and public funds. In addition, these rentals tend to rarely accommodate adequate parking for their tenants, let alone when each tenant has a guest on big weekends. (I won't even get into the fact that many rentals detract from the landscape, and are operated by slumlords that purchased the buildings before the 80s, have not invested a cent and pretty much operate on 95% margin.)

Why isn't there some sort of accountability for this? For example, permits should not be based upon per apartment, but building. I would like to suggest turning the walk streets into vehicular traffic (again, I don't have the same right as they do in not having vehicles on my street) - they can be one-way streets with parking on both sides or

I don't know the formula but would there be more parking spots if diagonal parking just on one side?. If more diagonal spots per block than parallel spots then also turn one-way 27th Street between Manhattan Avenue and Hermosa Avenue to diagonal spots on the southside (as driveway cuts on northside). If more diagonal spots per block also turn Myrtle Avenue between 25th Street and 26th Street to diagonal on the eastside and no parking on the westside (eastside is North School property for majority of that block). If more diagonal spots per block - do the same with 29th Street between Valley Drive and Manhattan Avenue (which side would be determined by driveway cuts). If more diagonal spots per block from 28th Street north between Hermosa Avenue and Manhattan Avenue alternate those streets one-way with diagonal spots on the sides with the least driveway cuts. BEACH REPORTER (9/30) did say, "The council initially looked into the matter of raising residential parking permit rates in July **to help produce more money for the city**" hence my ideas instead of raising the parking permit rates.

When a property is getting 8, 9, 10 permits is a red flag to me - possibly bootleg units. 356 - 27th Street is listed on www.zillow.com as a single family property. But why would there be 2 mailboxes, one on 27th Street and one on Morningside Dr.? The garage converted into a unit now has all vehicles for both units on the street. Then my trash bill is subsidizing that 2nd unit's trash pickup with that property owner getting additional rental monies.

I am one who thinks it is absurd to be charged to park on the streets that my tax dollars already supports. I read in the DAILY BREEZE that they residents around the Torrance Court complained about court goers using street parking, so a parking permit program was set up there. Those residents getting parking permits at no charge.

Being 1/2 block from Valley Park I could easily not pay for a parking permit and park there, which I will probably be doing with any parking permit rate increase. My only worry there would be Monday morning street cleaning, which then I could park on 28th Street east of Morningside Dr.

Has someone LOST their mind??!!! Who's idea was this??!!!

- 1) If the city is hurting for funds, why not just reduce the high city salaries by 15-20%, like private enterprise does? (I received a 22.5% pay cut when Playboy lost their gambling interests) I doubt that the city manager would suggest such (let's just put more burden on the residents), so let the much needed cuts be in the hands of the city council as opposed to this parking permit increase proposal. The city employees have a 4 day week work, with Monday holidays off, then working in paradise to boot couldn't ask for a better deal in regards to work environment.
- 2) Or raise the bed tax before raising parking permits. I paid 15% when I visited San Francisco last summer. Let's have Hermosa Beach bed tax match that, as these people are using our city. Have them pay into the city fund for their use of the city.
- 3) I have seen permits on delivery trucks for use in some cities as these trucks use those city streets giving them wear and tear. With bed tax and delivery trucks permits the funds are coming from outside the city, not deep pocketing the people who live here.
- 4) The city came around to change out the parking signs this season (how much did those new signs cost?) to a 12-midnight new time. I only saw parking enforcement come around twice in early evenings of the new extended time.

Then over the Labor Day weekend I only saw parking enforcement come by on the Saturday, leaving Sunday and Monday with no ticket giving with many, many vehicles in violation of the 1-hour parking.

The 12 midnight and not ticketing over a full 3-day holiday weekend is not getting the full benefit in violations from such parking requirements.

and that any planting on the city property had to be approved - but a 25 foot tree on city property on the front northwest corner interfering with other people's views. This property presently has two non-operative vehicles stored on it).

The Strand home with a side walk-street, along with many walk-street homes, now have two to four more additional parking spots into this encroachment area. A usage value should be charged for all encroachment properties as they are having special private parking (no one else can park there but them). What are those parking spots worth? These people should be charge first for this use before parking permit increases.

- 6) I know of at least half-dozen bootleg apartments in the radius of the street to the south of me to the one to the north. Since these bootlegs are illegal and nothing is being done about them, the parking permits for those should be higher, since they are taking up more street parking. \$300-\$500 range for each permit on these properties.
- 356 27th Street (appears garage converted into an unit lose of 2 off-street parking spots)
 - 345 27th Court (a garage covered over in stucco converted to room)
- 245 1/2 26th Street (originally 2 units on the back, 1 a converted garage then
- a 3rd unit added to the front. Someone close to the front new unit said one of the

parking spots converted into an apartment - hence 4 units on what should be just 2)

342 – 28th Street (once had 3 mail boxes)

202, 232, $342 - 28^{th}$ Street (all with 2 units in the front and 1 additional unit over the

garages)

 $250 - 28^{th}$ Street (with a lower bedroom turned into an apartment, 3 units instead of

the 2 originally built).

I recall the owner of $252-26^{th}$ Court had wanted to turn a garage converted to a room back into a garage. But he said that the city said no, as the spot didn't not meet today's space requirement (was too small). One smaller than code off-street parking spot would have been better than leaving the property with no parking spots. That man and his wife both drove compact vehicles hence leaving both on the street in which one could go into that garage.

260 – 27th Street (had two major remodels over the years but existing parking was

never required to be brought up to code. 2 units, which should have 6 off-street

parking spots, today has none. 2 garages used as rooms and the other 2 for storage)

There are a number of half-lot properties with no off street parking what so ever, like $252-26^{th}$ Court mentioned above, along with $229-27^{th}$ Street, who should not be penalized in higher parking permit rates. There are also a number of early 1900s houses with just one parking spot. Logically these 2 types of property should be taken into consideration on the parking permit fees.

With the proposed higher rates, is the city going to assign parking spots just for our use?

I did mention about outsiders paying their fair share at the start of this letter.

- 7) Some pro-bicycle enthusiasts talked the city into sharing a traffic lane with motor vehicles (Hermosa Beach was not planned out as many Orange County neighborhoods that could put in bike routes as they were working from a clean slate). But these bicyclists do not follow the California vehicle code with not stopping at the stop signs and signals, speeding, and talking on cell phones. Doesn't Hermosa Beach get a share of traffic citations fines? Would be a "gold mine" for the city fund with the 8 to 10 in a pack that sail through the stop signs to receive citations.

9) TV news said Huntington Beach to charge non-residents \$140 emergency responce fee.

Just keep the parking permits at the present rate. Cut and freeze salaries. Look for funding from the outsiders.

It is absurd to me that the residents are being charged to park on the streets that their tax dollars support to begin with. Also parking permit fees should be waived for those 62 year and older, like the lighting and utility tax.

Dear City Council members:

Since I will be out of the country next week for the parking Public Hearing, I thought I would send you a quick note to get my two cents in....afterall, I pretty much started this whole thing!

Parking in the so-called impacted area (west of Loma and south of 8th street) has reached a crisis point. On most nights after 6:00 pm and on weekends (especially during the summer), it is often impossible to find a convenient parking spot. Residents who require street parking frequently have to waste time and gas driving in circles or resort to parking illegally and risking a ticket. In basic economic terms, demand for street parking far exceeds the supply of available spaces. Since there is not much we can do about the supply, we need to find ways to attack the demand.

Currently, it is legitimate for property owners in the impacted area to get one window permit for each vehicle registered to the property plus one guest permit for each property. Given the relatively low cost for these permits (\$40), many property owners (including myself) get as many permits as they are eligible for. This easy access to permits has unfortunately allowed property

owners to convert their garages to workshops, play spaces, and illegal apartments. It is also allows property owners to park on the street during busy periods to reserve garage spaces for their guests. This doesn't sound that egregious except that residents who need these spaces often cannot get them. It is a clear case of "gaming the system." It doesn't violate the letter of the law but it clearly violates the spirit and ultimately it artificially increases demand.

I do not believe that raising the permit prices alone will solve the problem. However, I do think it is a logical first step and will make people who don't actually NEED the permits to think twice about getting them. In other words, it might help reduce demand. I think it is critically important for members of the community to understand that the Council is not increasing fees to increase revenue. Rather it is increasing fees to try to instigate a change in behavior. There are those who may argue that \$300 for a guest permit is steep. But \$300 for the right to park close to the beach 24/7/365 is truly a bargain! If you don't agree then let your guests find and pay for their own parking! Similarly, \$100 for the right for residents to park on the street in this neighborhood for an entire year is a bargain!

In the long- term, we need to find other ways to reduce demand. One way to do this is to not allow residents who have legal off-street spaces to get permits for the vehicles that should be parked in them. In other words, if you have two legal garage spaces, then you should not be allowed permits for the first two vehicles registered to the property. This will require time and money on the front-end to verify the number of legal off-street spaces on each property in the impacted area. However, after the initial expense, this will reduce the number of permits issued and permanently reduce demand. (This is turn poses a problem for reduced revenue for the city which will be compensated for by the increase in cost per permit.)

As far as employee parking, I do not see any reason whatsoever that local business employees need permits to park in the impacted area. The area is almost exclusively residential. Why not put a program in place to encourage local employees to park in the city lots or city parking structure? (Or simply make it a different type of permit.) These facilities are typically under-utilized during normal business hours. Evening employees of downtown bars and restaurants should prefer to be close to downtown anyway. This will have the desired effect of further reducing demand in the impacted area.

On a separate but related note, the Council's plan to allow RV's to continue to park in the impacted area as long as they have one permit for each parking space they use is ludicrous! RV's should simply not be allowed to park on the street in this area. Period. They are dangerous (block pedestrian and driver sightlines), unsightly, take up valuable overnight parking spots needed by residents, and simply do not belong here. They belong in appropriate long-term parking areas or on private property.

I look forward to hearing the results of the Public Hearing.

Two options are:

- 1. Create MORE physical parking spaces by turning some of the walk streets into driving streets with parking on them.
- 2. Create MORE physical parking spaces by turning some of the existing 2 way streets into 1-way streets there by adding additional parking on the other side of the street.

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on the proposed parking pass fee increases.

My husband and I have lived on the first block of 18th St. in Hermosa Beach for four years. We consider ourselves lucky to have a one-car garage, but that still means we must park one of our two cars on the street. We both purchase parking passes, to allow for flexibility in who parks in the garage vs. the street. We also purchase a guest pass, which allows family and friends to visit us without watching a meter.

I understand the City's need to generate additional parking pass fees, but the new proposed rates -- especially those for guest passes -- are draconian! Charging \$60 for each of the first **two** passes -- a 50% increase -- would be reasonable. I **am** in favor of charging significantly more for the third (and fourth, and fifth, etc.) resident parking permit(s), in order to disincentivise abuse. The guest pass should cost \$60, or the same as the first resident permit.

Suddenly raising the rates as proposed, by as much as 300%, would place an undue burden on beachside residents, who must purchase these passes in order to live here with some degree of convenience. Diagonal Parking Spaces

On-street parking spaces in downtown Canton consist of both the traditional parallel spaces as well as diagonal spaces. The main reason for the diagonal parking is that it provides more parking spots for downtown visitors. Secondary benefits include traffic calming and many people like the ambience that is created. Diagonal spaces are enforced similarly to parallel spaces. The only difference is the layout and orientation of the spaces. The diagonal spaces are "back-in" spots; a driver must back into the spot to park and pull out to leave. The diagonal parking was implemented in this was for safety reasons. Although it may be more difficult to back into a spot than to pull in, it is far safer to pull out into the travel lane when leaving than to back into the lane.

I had never seen the back-in spots on one-way before ideal for the one-way streets in Hermosa Beach with hills so the vehicles won't roll down the hill.

Could also provide more parking on ALL streets like those from Hermosa Avenue to Manhattan Avenue from south Hermosa to north Hermosa.

Parking permit costs could rise

☐The days of residents buying \$40 parking permits for one, two, three or even more vehicles seem to be over. □□At its Sept. 28 meeting, Hermosa Beach's City Council voted to hold a public hearing regarding its desire to increase parking permits to \$100 for the first two registered vehicles, \$200 for a third permit and \$300 for a fourth or more, including a quest pass.

Residents and business owners will be welcome to voice their opinions at the meeting; however, the item has not been schedule vet, according to City Manager Steve Burrell. Then it will be up to the City Council to determine exactly what the rate increase will be. □□The council initially looked into the matter of raising residential parking permit rates in July to help produce more money for the city and to curb Hermosa Beach parking problems. The city's preferential parking program generated \$405,495 in revenue during the 2009-10 fiscal year. With many business owners and residents buying multiple permits annually, the council felt it was time to adjust the system. □□But a 3-2 vote didn't leave the entire council in harmony. □□Staff recommended the council open a public hearing with new rates starting at \$120 for the first two vehicles, \$180 for a third permit, \$240 for each additional vehicle and \$120 for a guest permit. □□Councilman Kit Bobko felt the \$120 for the first two vehicles was fine, but said the third should be upped to \$240 and anything more than that should be priced at \$360, including a quest permit. □□"We have more cars than we do parking spaces," Bobko said. "We have to decrease the number of cars or increase the number of parking spaces. Our only option is to decrease the number of cars."

He said higher prices for multiple permits will deter residents from buying so many and keep business owners from purchasing in bulk for their employees.

But Councilman Michael DiVirgilio was concerned if the numbers are too high, they'd fill the council chambers with angry residents when the public hearing takes place. □ □ Tucker said the current rate of \$40 for all permits is too low and agreed something needs to be done. □□"We need to encourage people to use their garages or car ports," Tucker said. □Tucker thought starting permits at \$60 and raising the price in increments of \$20 was appropriate. But that was not approved. He said rates that jump more than \$100 aren't justified. □□"It's not a fund-raiser for our city to pay bills," Tucker said. □□Then DiVirgilio recommended having the first two permits be \$100, the third \$200 and \$300 for a fourth or more, including a quest permit. Those figures were approved 3-2 by the City Council. Mayor Pro Tem Howard Fishman and Councilman Jeff Duclos voted no

because they wanted to hire a consultant to help determine how much the city should increase its rates. But the other two councilmen did not feel it was worth the estimated \$13,000 to \$30,000 to do so and agreed to move forward with DiVirgilio's recommendation. \square City officials also plan to revisit oversized vehicle parking permits, but not in conjunction with residential and business parking permits.

Subject: Proposed (up to) 650% Increase in Parking Permit Fees

Attached is a letter regarding the permit fee increases. Please see that all councilmen and other interested parties receive it ASAP, together with this note, and that copies are made available with the agendas at the January 11th meeting.

I think that the summary in the January 3rd Staff Report that states that the correspondence received to date indicates that residents "generally object" to the proposed increases qualifies as the understatement of the year. According to my count, I would summarize them as:

In Favor: 2 (Jerry Gross and Rich Anthony)

Against: 35

Strongly Against: 45 (using words such as Outragous, Excessive, Ridiculous, Hardship, Offensive, Absurd, Money Making Scam, Joke, Punative, Unreasonable, Idiotic, Not well thought out, Discriminatory, Unfounded, Unwarranted, "Are You Serious", "We are being bent over", Drastic, Outlandish, Exorbinent, Insane)

Other: 2

That is 2 for, 80 Against. 98% NO (with 56% HELL NO). And that is with just a small postcard notice in the mail. I don't follow it closely, but I would assume that 84 responses is a lot for any matter before the council on 3 days notice, and in my experience it is virtually unprecedented for 98% of people in Hermosa Beach to agree on anything--even the color of the sky!

The people have spoken. Loudly.

I also think that, given the tremendous opposition, it was very **misleading** to put one of the (only two) notes in favor of the change in the very front of the correspondence attachment (maybe it was inadvertent, but given the odds of 1 in 84, I doubt it)--especially given the fact that they were otherwise in random order. That was a little sneaky, and perhaps it reveals that despite overwhelming opposition, someone is trying to stack the deck a bit. While Mr. Gross certainly has a right to his opinion, his is worth no more than any other resident's, but putting his at the front of the stack would make it seem that it was. I would also add that there are other laws on the books to address Jerry's concern that issuing permits has allowed folks to convert garages into illegal apartments--they just have to be enforced. And while he apparently thinks there is a problem with people parking on the street with a permit so that their guests (like my 80 year old mom) can park in my garage and have dinner with her family, I think that is immanently reasonable.

Since it is the lone letter in support of raising the fees that gives any reason (the other letter just says he supports it), I will address Mr. Gross's letter a little. First, I note that he choose to live on a street--400 block of Bayveiw-- with NO STREET PARKING to begin with-- and to add to

that, becasue of the two-on-a-lots with driveways instead of parking spaces and 3 story conds on Monterey, there aren't many spaces there either. What he seems to be saying is that he likes the convenience of parking it the street, and he wants you to raise the price so he can park there more easily, without competing with his neighbors. Just becasue he can afford and is willing to pay more doesn't make it right. And if he doesn't like having to "circle the block" to find a space, why doesn't he just park in his garage? He thinks \$300 for a guest pass is a "bargain". So I guess he thinks it is right that I pay \$300 so my dad can visit me every couple of weeks. Now, I love my dad, and if I had to I would pay much more than \$300--but that doesn't make it fair! My friend 3 blocks east can have his dad park on his street without a pass.

Mr. Gross is, however, right on regarding oversized vehicle parking (i.e., campers). It makes no sense to permit people to use the streets as storage yards for RV's 50 months a year--park it on your property or put it in a storage facility. I was in Burbank recently, and the first thing I saw as I came off the freeway was a big sign that said "NO RV STREET PARKING IN BURBANK."

The January 3rd report also **mischarecterized** Mr. Siedlecki's comments as a proposal that you should charge \$100 for the first permit, \$1,000 for the second, and \$5000 for the third, **without noting** that this example was meant to illustrate that people should not be able get more than one permit **per driver** (in other words, if there is a house with one driver, they should not be able to get permits for two cars). I don't think that this is really much of a problem, but I agree with it. However, it will be very difficult to administer, as there may be three or four drivers but the cars are all in the name of one person. Mr. Siedlecki goes on to strongly oppose the rate increases as proposed.

In Mr.DiVigilio's response to Mr. Hennis' note, he states that "many people are buying more than 3 and 4 permits and some are buying as many as 8, 9 or 10 permits for one address." First, I would point out that there are only 3 addresses out of 3,070 that purchase 8 or more permits, and second, I would refer him to the note from Ms. Goetz, which points out that there are some properties in Hermosa that have 8 units and 0 parking. I would also point out that fewer than 2% of the addresses have more than 4 permits, and the reason is probably due to situations such as this, plus bootlegs. But don't make everyone pay for the sins of the past (allowing development without adaquate parking) or the failure to properly police bootleg laws. In fact, maybe someone should take the list of addresses that buy more than 3 permits and check those addresses for bootleg apartments! But I digress.

Re: Proposed 150% to 650% Parking Permit Fee Increase

Gentlemen:

I am writing about the proposed increase in fees to certain Hermosa residents for the right to park on public streets in front of their own homes. I know that this will be addressed at the next City Council meeting, which I cannot attend, but I wanted to share my thoughts.

I have lived in Hermosa Beach for almost 20 years, and have been fortunate enough to always have lived within a block or two of the ocean—as a renter for the majority of that time but as a homeowner for the last 8 years. I have experienced first hand all of the many changes that have taken place over that time, and specifically in the "beach zone", on a daily basis. I think that I have a pretty good understanding of the issues. I have read the Staff Report dated July 20, 2010 (the "Report"), and the other reports prepared on this issue. I think that there are many problems with the concept of increasing the permit fees, as outlined below:

- 1. First and foremost, the Report itself (p.2) states that "the purpose of the program [is] to provide long-term residential parking for people impacted by beach parking while maintaining availability of public parking near the beach". The purpose is NOT to figure out a way to squeeze as much money as possible from residents who happen to live in the impacted zone. I actually think the current program works fairly well to achieve its stated goal already.
- 2. The Report states that "parking is a scarce commodity ...and pricing should be examined in this light." This is a disturbing way to look at this issue—the beach is also a scarce commodity, as are our parks—perhaps we should start figuring out how to maximize revenue from those resources as well by charging people to use these publicly owned resources?
- 3. I have always thought that it was not really right that my City would charge me to park in front of my own home, or limit the number of guests I could invite to my home for dinner without risking a ticket or forcing them to move their car by only letting me buy one guest pass—or forcing me to make a special trip to buy more one-day passes. Nonetheless, I have put up with it, as the \$10-\$40 over the years has been relatively affordable and I assumed most of it went to administer the program, which is reasonable. To now try to raise the prices by 150% (first pass) to 650% (guest pass) is crazy. And the idea that the proposed ridiculous new rates were only announced so that residents will happily accept increases of, say, 50%, just relieved that you didn't raise it further, has been expressed by some—and if true, is an insult to your constituents. While that approach may be Politics 101 (ask for something crazy so you are a hero when you ask for something only half-crazy), it should not be used around here.

- 4. The Report also states (p.2) that increasing the fees from \$40 to "a fee that better represents the <u>value</u> of the permit"—again revealing what appears to be a thinly veiled attempt to simply use this as a ruse to try to maximize revenue at the expense of a minority of City residents. That simply isn't right. Again, Hermosa doesn't charge anything to walk on the Strand, but there are certainly people would be willing to pay for that "privilege". Why not charge them? Or why not fence Valley Park or the greenbelt and charge people to use them—some people would certainly pay. And the biggest "opportunity" of all would be to figure out a way to charge people to use our beautiful beach. Is somebody working on that? Oh yeah—that pesky Coastal Commission probably wouldn't allow that, or I fear that some of the Council members might try to actually do it.
- 5. While it is true that Laguna Beach is off the charts with respect to the fees that it charges, Laguna is CLEARLY not anywhere near the norm. If you look at the other cities listed in the April 22, 2010 report (i.e., Seal Beach, Santa Monica and Long Beach), the average is in the \$20-25 per permit range. Let's expand the universe a bit. Assuming my quick search on the web was correct, the City of Los Angeles has established many residential parking zones, and it charges an annual fee of \$34 per permit. Huntington Beach (the "Other" Surf City) charges \$23 for the first pass, \$6 each for the next 3, and issues 2 FREE guest permits (cost of 3 plus a guest pass is \$35 total, vs. \$160 last year in Hermosa and \$700 under new rates). West Hollywood charges \$15 for the first permit, \$20 for the second, \$35 for the third, and \$50 for the fourth, with up to 2 guest passes at \$22/each and unlimited one-day passes at no charge. San Clemente has several impact areas in which it offers residents FREE permits for every registered car plus up to four FREE guest passes.
- 6. What the reports do not seem to talk about is exactly who is complaining, and why. I saw in the record that one person complained that on weekends if he left, it was hard to find a space when he returned. While it is true that on nice beach days that occur on holidays and weekends it is difficult for residents to find street parking, this will be the case no matter what the City charges for permits. Charging more for permits won't change that. Further, the lone complainant mentioned above should have at least ONE on-site spot that he could use for weekend parking.
- 7. If, as one Council member seems to be obsessed with, the goal is to find the "value" of a parking spot to residents, obviously that value differs for every person. Perhaps we should have a sliding scale, based upon people's annual net income. Or maybe their net worth would be a better measure. Should the 82 year-old resident with a one car garage, that has his 25 year old Corolla in it, and is barely squeaking by on a small fixed income, have to fork over \$300 so his caretaker who helps him 3 days a week can use a quest pass? And the "value" to the attorney who makes 5 times more than the average Hermosian is obviously more than the "value" to a single mother scraping by whose landlord can't or won't make a space available to her (yes, this happens, particularly since eliminating bootlegs hasn't been a priority). The point is, "value" or ability to pay has never been, nor should it be, the point of the program. The point should be to provide Hermosa residents who happen to live in an area where non-residents like to park a "preference" to park in front of their own home, and have nurses, gardeners, handymen, friends and family members the opportunity to do the same (one at a time, via a guest pass), at a price that basically covers the cost of the program. It should not be

treated as a profit center for the city. Further, if we want to be fair and maximize revenues, let's figure out the "value" for every resident in Hermosa. If I live in Hermosa Valley, for instance, while I may not have as many beachgoers taking up street parking, there still may be a "value" to me to be able to park on the street (since people do, obviously this is true). Let's find where their marginal point of return is and charge them \$1 less than that. People in the hills park on their streets too. They must value that. Let's charge them! Why just pick on some residents? There is money to be made!! I will make you a deal—if you charge everyone in Hermosa to park in front of their home, I will withdraw all objections!!

8. Even if people have a garage, and usually use it, why should they have to pay an absurd amount if they want the right, on occasion, to hop out of their car on a summer weekday when the street isn't even crowded in between errands to do some stuff at home for a couple of hours without lifting up the garage door, or parking in a detached garage that is not very convenient, or for some other reason. I usually park in the garage, but sometimes I like to park on the street for one reason or another. In front of my own home. Another example—I have a frail, elderly neighbor on a small pension who has lived here 40 years who keeps her car in the garage at night, but 2 or 3 times a week she runs errands and likes to park on the street because her access to the garage is difficult, with lots of stairs and a heavy old door that she has to get out of the car to lift up and down. And she uses the guest pass because her kids come by occasionally and she doesn't want to have to shuttle the car out of the garage when they come over. You want to stick her with a \$300 bill?

I think it is extremely reasonable to allow a resident the ability to park their own car in front of their own house, whether it is overnight, for a couple of hours because they have a detached garage that is a hassle to access, or because they want to allow their guests to come to dinner and park in the off-street parking so that the guests don't have to move their car or risk a ticket. But I think it is extremely unreasonable to expect a family with three drivers (mom, dad, and daughter that attends local college) to pay \$700 (with a guest pass) for that "privilege." SEVEN HUNDRED BUCKS TO BE ABLE TO PARK IN FRONT OF YOUR OWN HOUSE??

Parking will always be an issue here in Hermosa. But let's not ream the residents who happen to live in an "impacted zone". While many will grudgingly pay for the permit, because it is basically a necessity, others who may make less but are even more deserving or needful (like my neighbor who needs a nurse) won't be able to afford it and will have a big problem to deal with unnecessarily. It is extremely unfair to stick this on only some residents just because they happen to live near the beach. Heck, if you really want to reduce street parking and increase revenue, why not take it to the extreme—charge \$1,000 per permit. I have no doubt that there are at least 500 people in the impact zone for whom money is no object who would pay that amount, and it would decrease your permits from about 9,600 to, say, 500 while raising your revenues by 20%!! Brilliant! Or limit it to 5,000 permits and just auction them off to the highest bidders, and the other residents who can't afford more be damned.

Furthermore, if you do implement these ridiculous new fees, representing a huge increase in historical fees (I don't have the data, but would be curious to see the percent increase in these fees over the last 10 years—my bet is that it far outpaced inflation), you are going to have more unhappy residents, because many people who live in an impacted area but within a block or two of a non-impacted area will just choose to park a block or so

away and thus create more problems for the now non-impacted zones, which will make more people unhappy. Not to mention the fact that if you do implement these outrageous fees and you (or the next council) see the error in your ways and want to reduce them back to a reasonable amount, query whether you will then need to get Coastal Commission approval.

At the very least, you should do a **proper** survey about how your constituents—and in particular the ones who are impacted by this proposed **150%-650% increase** (depending on how many and what type of permits) really feel about this. I suspect that some will show up for the January 11th meeting, but we all know that people are busy, uninformed (even if they did get a little post-card in the mail), shy, housebound, and/or sometimes hesitant to make the effort to appear at hearings. That certainly doesn't mean that they don't care or should be ignored. However, judging by the 98% negative feedback that is represented in the 84 comments that you already got on this issue in the few days since the little notice went out, I think you can save the time and cost of a survey and assume that the affected residents are overwhelmingly against anything other than a modest increase in permit fees.

Thank you for the opportunity to submit opinions on this long neglected issue. Here are some of my thoughts, put together in an hour or so, so they really call for more reflection.

I recently read about a study that suggests that public policy on inexpensive parking has encouraged the increase in traffic and parking congestion in Los Angeles. I think you will find that many residents find it more cost-effective to fill their garages with storage and park their cars on the street. Others have converted their garages to living or recreational space, because it is almost free to park their cars on the street. Rental units have been built with inadequate parking (especially now that there are often 2 adult drivers occupying each bedroom), because when older units were built, there was often only 1 person per bedroom (based on my experience as a landlord), and there is almost no cost to parking on the street.

While I think it's great to establish new precedent that streets should no longer represent (almost) free parking for everyone, it is both awkward and untimely that the current economic conditions likely drive city council to suddenly impose a significant increase in street parking costs.

Parking permit cost to support public policy

I support the increase in parking permit cost, but suggest that increases be phased in over a period of 1-3 years to enable residents to adapt more comfortably to new public parking/ street utilization policy. Wouldn't it be great to come home and have many parking spaces available because your neighbors have found it better to use their garages for cars than storage? Or do we encourage paving over small patches of open green space on residential lots for open concrete parking space? Of course, living in such a desirable beach community, we need to expect and understand that our streets will be parked up on summer weekends, whether or not we are collecting fees for their use. And as you explore public policy more, you might find that if residents clear lots of cars off the streets to save money, that will make room for lots more out-of-town visitors – a possible unintended consequence.

First, what is public street parking policy in Hermosa Beach? (This is what I think the debate should be about. And Hermosa is such a great place for debate.)

Second, let's do a back-of-the-envelope analysis of the cost of a parking space. A parking space on their lot may cost a new resident in the impacted neighborhood \$4500 per year, and a garage would cost \$5,250 per year based on the following simplified factors. For a new resident not on the strand, they might look at an average 2700 sq ft lot, typical 2700 sq ft newer home, average land cost of \$800,000, yielding a \$300 /sq ft land cost. And average construction cost for a 10 x 20 ft garage may be \$15,000 or so. Thus a 10x20' parking space might cost a homeowner \$90,000 and a 10 x20' single garage space might cost \$105,000. The mortgage cost at current low 5% interest on \$90,000 is \$4500 per year. With this as a comparison, a \$300 street parking space is a bargain. It's easy to understand why there are few empty parking spaces on the street. A longer-term resident, who may have paid half that price for their home, would have a proportionally lower cost, but street parking is still a bargain. Not that a resident computes the cost of their garage, but they have a sense that it's valuable space.

Employee Parking

I don't understand why you would consider increasing the employee parking fee. If the city pays for employee parking, it is a net \$0 benefit, and if the employee has to pay the city more to work here, then this is just a way to reduce their net compensation. Why should they be forced to pay payroll taxes on income that is just handed back to the city in fees? If the objective is to reduce employee compensation, better deal with it directly.

Please decide wisely.

Dear City Council Members,

I regret I am unable to attend the January 11 city council meeting, but I do hope my voice is heard through this communication.

As a 40 year homeowner and resident on Myrtle Avenue, I object to the proposed fee structure in the most vehement terms.

The resident parking permit system began as a <u>convenience</u> to residents near the beach as we were greatly impacted by beachgoers parking in front of our homes. We tolerated the modest fees, and their periodic increases, to help us park on our streets in front of our homes. There was a belief that these fees somehow offset the cost of administering the system, but of course we know it was just an income line in the general fund. Last year, to our annoyance, the enforcement hours were changed on our street to be aligned to downtown bar visitor limitations rather than beachgoers, even though we are not impacted by downtown. This change adds to our local inconvenience and should be reversed.

Now the "Residential Parking Permit" system has been rebranded to the "Preferential Parking" program. Along with this rebranding comes a proposal raise the fees by 150% and more, thereby making the system a major income generator beyond the parking tickets issued in the enforcement zone. If I have correctly read the city's budget, current permit revenues are \$394,000; hardly a trivial amount. I can only guess what the proposed increase would generate, but someone must be dangling figures well in excess of \$1,000,000. It must be tempting for those trying to raise revenues, but it is an outrage to we residents. (If this revenue boost is so critical, then make the system city-wide and enforce it 24/365 so everyone in the city can share the burden and benefits alike. In this case the system is no longer to be about being a convenience for residents anyway, so just go for as much revenue as is possible.)

<u>Summary</u>: Fees at the proposed level are simply unjustifiable and unacceptable. The proposal should be voted down, and I trust that council members who represent the residents and homeowners who voted for them will see it the same way.

Importance: High

I realize that there are justifiable concerns among residents that reasonable parking opportunities be provided. I contend that this can be achieved without a disproportionate burden of the responsibility falling on the shoulders of a select few coastal residents.

The Argument:

The City Council is considering raising the parking tax on a select group of Hermosa Beach residents from \$40 to as much as \$300 per vehicle, a **750% increase**. Don't let them fool you into thinking they're doing you a favor when the council offer's you a \$60 settlement. That is still a 50% tax increase on top of what you as a Hermosa Beach resident already pay.

This is allegedly being done to finance a system [fund 110] designed to provide parking opportunities for the entire community as well as coastal visitors.

This taxation is arbitrary and, being neither necessary, fair, uniform, nor apportioned is unjust, and must be terminated.

The Solution:

The City of Hermosa Beach shall apportion the revenues generated from visitor parking fees and fines and allocate funds to provide residents in the affected areas Resident Parking Passes free of charge.

The Reasoning:

Coastal access can be funded entirely from parking meter collections and meter violations. The City of Hermosa Beach reports collecting nearly **Two Million Dollars** a year in coins from parking meters alone!

As a reference, the last reported example available in which parking enforcement was a

separate department, the city reported operational expenses of approximately \$790,000, which included street sweeping operations. Discovering today's fiscal equivalent is not as easy. The duties and responsibilities of parking enforcement have been reallocated to fall under the far less specific umbrella of the Hermosa Beach Police Department and are therefore reported in a much more general way.

The Treasurers Office may not make a clear and concise reporting, but we can extrapolate from this previous data.

The same year that parking enforcement was costing the city \$790,000, a revenue was reported of \$724,000 in coins collected from the cities parking meters. In 2008-09 this collection is reported to have totaled just over \$1,665,000, and in the 2009-10 fiscal year the City of Hermosa Beach reports collecting \$1,908,730 in coins from parking meters alone, a 260% increase from our reference point. If we were to allow for a 260% increase in the city's costs, today's parking enforcement would require just over \$2,054,000 in annual funding.

Keep in mind that the numbers I've mentioned so far only include coins collected from parking meters. Millions of dollars of revenue are realized every year from ticketing; meter violations, non-meter "one hour" violations, and street sweeping violations. **Ticketing generates** millions in *additional* revenue.

Now add to that number nearly half a million in revenue from guest parking permits, driveway permits, day permits, contractor permits and the all too familiar resident parking permit, and we get a pretty clear idea of what a windfall the city realizes from the implementation of Coastal Access.

Where does the surplus go?

Any funds collected in excess of costs (operating parking enforcement fund 110), are funneled to the General Fund, which means; not only is a very select group of Hermosa Beach residents supposedly footing the bill for coastal access for the entire community, but we are also being held responsible for bills associated with a number of communal expenses such as General Administration, Maintenance & Construction, and City Insurance Premiums.

Conclusion:

We ask that this form of taxation be terminated and that eligible residents of the City of

Hermosa Beach be issued resident parking passes free of charge.

The city of Hermosa Beach should continue to provide visitors and residents the benefits intended by fund 110, and do so with funds generated by visitor contributions (metered parking) and violation fees (one hour/meter violation ticketing).

Fund 110 should not be viewed by city government as an opportunity to generate revenue in an effort to bolster the General Fund.

Dear Hermosa Beach City Council Members:

We are writing to voice our vehement objections to the proposed increased fees for parking permits. More than 150% increase for just the first resident permit, and an over 700% increase for a guest permit is absolutely ludicrous and completely unwarranted! For those of us who live in the restricted parking zone, the proposed increases are tantamount to extortion! Realistically, we have no choice but to buy at least one permit. Otherwise, we (or our guests) cannot ever park in front of (or even near) our own house for more than an hour without risk of getting a ticket! It is our understanding that the parking permit requirement in the sand section and near the business districts was meant to *protect* the residents in those areas by deterring beach goers and other visitors from taking over our streets. In this instance, however, it seems that the permit requirement is being used to *punish* us with an extreme and unfair parking "tax."

Although we typically park both our cars in our garage, there are times when it is necessary for us to park one car on the street, such as when we are cleaning the garage. Furthermore, when we have guests visit, it would be unreasonable to expect them to park a long distance from our house. Therefore, it is still necessary for us to buy at least one guest permit each year. At the new proposed rate, it would cost us \$500 a year (\$200 for our own cars and \$300 for a guest permit) to be able to park our two cars on our street, and to have a friend over to visit!

We understand that the idea of increasing permit fees came up as a result of complaints against those who have abused the system in the past. However, to the extent there are residents who own multiple cars and are taking up all the spaces on any given street, we trust that the Council should be able to come up with a more reasonable and tailored solution--one that does not punish ordinary residents who just want to be able to park a car or two near their own house and have a friend or two over for dinner.

If there is a problem with residents owning multiple cars and taking up all the spaces, then why not increase the fee only after the second car? Although, if someone has the wealth to own numerous cars, it is doubtful that increased permit fees would deter them from parking those cars on the streets. Alternatively, why not just maximize the number of resident parking permits that can be issued to any one residence?

As for guest permits, there is already in place a limit of one permit per residence. Therefore, there is no room for abuse by getting multiple guest permits, and no legitimate reason for such an extreme rate increase. It is simply insane for us to have to pay \$300 a year just so a friend can visit for more than an hour!

It is simply unfair to punish ALL the residents of the restricted parking zone for the alleged abuse by a few. We are hopeful that the council will be able to find an alternate solution to the problem—one that is more reasonable and narrowly tailored to address the specific problems at hand.

I oppose raising the rates for the hanging guest pass. I am fortunate to have several on-site parking spaces at my home. Nevertheless, each year I purchase a hanging guest pass for my guests. It is in fact used only about 10 times a year when I have more guests than my property can accommodate. The \$40 price is reasonable; \$100 is too high; \$300 is outrageous.

I realize that many residents do not have parking and need to park their cars on our streets every day. Compared to a monthly garage rental, \$100 annually is a bargain. Moreover, apartment owners that do not provide parking for their tenants are profiting by burdening the city streets.

Paying for the cost for street parking should be more closely matched to those who use it. I would like to see you preserve a guest parking program for true guests that is reasonably priced.

The upcoming 01/11/11 City Council Meeting includes a discussion regarding the options for amending the City's current Preferential Parking Program.

Although most of the discussion has been focused on raising the cost of the parking permits within the Preferential Parking District (generally the area west of Loma Drive), I would like to discuss the issue of Driveway Permits.

According to the Staff Report for the 07/27/10 City Council Meeting, the Driveway Permit Program has been in effect since 1984 and this is a city-wide program. I would request that City staff confirm that the City Council intended this to be a city-wide program or perhaps intended the Driveway Permit Program to affect only the City's Preferential Parking District area; this can be done by researching the applicable City Resolution, City Council Staff Report, and City Council Meeting minutes.

If the city-wide applicability of the Driveway Permit Program is confirmed, then I request that the City Council consider removing the Driveway Permit requirement for all City areas outside of the current Preferential Parking District.

Since there are no current parking restrictions (other than street sweeping restrictions) and no preferential parking districts for the areas east of Loma Drive, the Driveway Permit Program is unnecessary in these areas. While the City's current Preferential Parking Program affects on-street parking within the Preferential Parking District then the Driveway Permit Program within this area is consistent with the restrictions to onstreet parking within the District. Since there are no current Preferential Parking Programs that affect on-street parking outside of the current District, then the city-wide applicability of the Driveway Permit Program is inconsistent with the on-street parking of the area outside of the District.

Removing this requirement of the Driveway Permit Program will also require modification of City Municipal Code Section 10.32.080.

I have lived in Hermosa since 1977. Since 1983 I have owned my own home. During all of that time I have lived West of Morningside and North of 26 th Street. Until reviewing the 115 page report on this subject was completely unaware of the driveway permits. Since 1977 I have never understood how the city could complain and worry about parking and yet approved driveways on the street for new homes that have access from an alley. And now you are proposing to increase the permit by only \$10 dollars on a one time basis. I see no logical reason to grant these homeowners the benefit of an inexpensive on street parking pass when the driveway should, in the cases I have noted, never have been permitted.

As to the proposed increases in the other permits, stating the obvious, the sudden and precipitous increases seem random at best. Is the objective to raise money, discourage residents from parking near their homes or local businesses (yellow meters)? What analysis has been done on whether the proposed increased amounts will do anything but price low income individuals and families out or purchasing passes? Has there been any study of other cities similar to Hermosa and the effectiveness of this sort of plan doing anything other than raising money?

Assuming that the City can offer some legitimate and supportable reasons for a rate increase, then I recommend in be phased in over a period of three years. For example raise the \$40 yearly fee to \$60 the first year. Follow that with an analysis of the number and type of permits purchased, evidence of greater availability of parking. Then if the is continued support for and valid in the plan raise the fee from \$60 to \$90.

At present this proposal seems reactive, without any evidence that it will serve the desired purposes.

If the Council decides to approve the massive increases, then permit holders should be allowed to park an all meters, yellow or not.

In conclusion I think the Council should really consider whether parking in Hermosa is a problem or a virtue. It is always described as a problem because it is limited. However, on a holiday weekend it is usually Santa Monica or Huntington Beach that are on the news with pictures of the thousands of people at the beaches filling the parking lots, not Hermosa. I have always looked upon that as a positive. Hermosa cannot be overrun because there simply is not enough parking. There never will be enough and the Council needs to embrace that, rather try ineffective,

piecemeal approaches that will ultimately have little or no impact on the "problem."

Please reconsider these excessively large increases and take a more gradual approach over a three year period, while evaluating the impacts each year.

I am appalled and outraged by the proposed changes to the Preferential Parking program. It sounds like it was proposed by a wealthy, uncaring, out of touch individual new to Hermosa. This parking permit was originally intended to enable residents to have access to a parking space during the warmer months when beach attendance is high and parking is at a premium. For those people who must park at a meter all the time it is so they won't have to pay every night since they can park at a yellow meter for free with the permit.

The current fee of \$40 is high enough and has gone up frequently since the program originated. A reasonable increase of \$10 at the most would be acceptable but an increase of 250% is totally unreasonable. A fee of \$300 for a guest pass is a fine not a fee. I walk on the strand nearly every day and always see dogs on the beach playing Frisbee, running around, sitting or pooping. Some people take their dog to the beach every afternoon so the dog can poop on the sand. I guess they don't like the concrete but there are signs posted every block that say no animals on the beach.

I do not object to reasonable gradual increases in the cost for the parking pass but the increase by up to 750% for the guest pass is extremely unreasonable. In addition, the scaled cost of the residential permit does not take into account of the size of the address. For example, it is unfair for the residents of a 3 bedroom place with 3 different residents (\$600 for the 3 residential permits at \$200 each) compared to a single resident at a 1 bedroom address (\$100 for the permit).

I understand that the city is facing difficult financial issues with decrease tax revenue with lower property values and lawyer cost related to the oil contract lawsuit. The city council needs to act responsibly now and not appear to be gauging the local residents with exorbitant parking permit increases. I do not know about the other residents but I would not object to raising the parking permit fees by \$20/year up to a maximum fee of \$140 per residential permit and for the one current guest pass that we are allowed to purchase. I think it is really important to keep these parking permits all at the same cost. If the city needs more money, they could allow residents to purchase additional guest pass at \$300 each. Since this would be an additional pass not previously available to the residents, it would not be unreasonable to charge more for that one.

Gentlemen of the City Council of Hermosa Beach,

I am a relatively new resident in Hermosa Beach. I would first like to commend and thank you for your efforts and commitment to our community.

I am not sure that I will be able to attend the city council meeting tonight. I would still like to share my thoughts on the upcoming parking proposal. I understand the intention of the proposal is to encourage people to park in their garages. However, I do not believe that the current proposal will have the intended consequences.

\$300 for a Guest Pass will make street parking worse, not better.

I will not buy a \$300 guest pass. On evenings that I expect a guest to visit my home, I will move my vehicle to a spot on the street and invite my guests to park in my driveway. When my guests depart they will vacate my driveway spot, but I will likely leave my car in a street spot. For me, the net result of a price increase for the guest pass will be that I utilize more street parking, not less.

I suspect that other members of the community will adopt the same strategy. I believe that pushing people away from the guest pass system will result in longer utilization of parking spots by residents with permanent passes. I strongly urge the members of the council to vote against the \$300 price increase for guest passes.

Increasing the parking pass price from \$40 to \$100 will not motivate residents to park in their garages and may be a burden for some.

A change in price from \$40 to \$100 for a primary parking pass is trivial for many. This will not encourage many people to park in their garages. As I wrote to a colleague whose car doesn't fit in her garage, "Are you going to remodel your garage (thousands) to fit your car because of a \$60 price increase? ---- no!!!"

Equally, for those people who rely on their garage for storage, do you think they are suddenly going to go out and rent a storage space (\$60/month) so they can move their cars into their garage? Also, unlikely.

I would also like to remind the council members that there are residents in this town who live on a fixed income. Although \$60 may be trivial to some, it may represent a larger burden for others.

Alternative

I would encourage the members of the council to think a bit outside the box to address this issue. Specifically, I would recommend that the council consider providing a free guest pass or offer a second guest parking passes for residents that don't apply for a primary parking permit. This may provide an incentive for those who might utilize their garage/

The council may also consider specific incentives or interventions for problem areas where residents are not using their garages.

In summary, I caution the city council against the proposed price increases for parking permits. I do not believe that these changes will result in the increased utilization of garage parking spots.

If the council decides to proceed with the proposed price changes, I would appreciate a clear justification for how city government will spend these increased revenues.

Hi Michael,

I appreciate your response.

I believe the real problem with the "abuse" of the parking permit system arises from multi-residential properties that do not have enough off-street parking for their tenants.

If you search on Craigslist or Westside Rentals you will find that at least 1/2 of the properties for rent in Hermosa offer zero off-street parking. This indicates a glut of bootleg rentals which are largely contributing to our parking problem. Raising the parking passes will not reduce the number of cars parked on the street. These units have no parking available. The tenants HAVE to park on the street. You can raise the parking rate to \$1,000 per year but these people will still have to park on the street. The only result will be a reduction in rental rates for properties that offer no parking.

This is the root of the problem which the City needs to be addressing. Unfairly punishing the rest of us is not a solution.

With respect to East Hermosa Beach residents who feel they should be allowed to purchase parking permits, their argument is without merit. Everyone chooses where they live. Property owners who live West of PCH have paid a premium

to purchase their properties and typically pay more every year in property taxes so they can enjoy closer proximity to the beach. Residents who choose to live in East Hermosa can access the beach via a long walk, a bike ride or by paying to park. West Hermosa residents are simply trying to park in front of their homes - not park so they can go to the beach for enjoyment. West Hermosa Residents' need is a necessity. The request of the East Hermosa Residents to park close to the beach is for convenience sake.

One idea might be to offer East Hermosa Beach Residents a beach shuttle program during the Summer months for a fee. The City could sell passes to the Residents and provide hourly shuttle service from various points in the City. This could be an income generator as well as an amenity.

Thought I would forward this on, I too agree with my fellow Hermosa Beach residents who are against raising parking pass fees..

I am a longtime resident of, and a registered voter in, Hermosa Beach. I am writing to express my opposition to the proposal to increase resident parking permit fees under consideration by the city council. Rather than increase the burden imposed on already cost-pressed Hermosa Beach residents, I think the city council should look into increasing the costs of meter parking for visitors to the area or increase the fee for parking in the various city parking lots. The city council should certainly NOT increase the costs charged to tax-paying residents.

As I understand the proposal, it would increase resident parking permit fees from \$40 to \$100 for the first permit, \$100 for the second permit, \$200 for the third permit and \$300 for each additional permit/guest pass.

These proposed fees are simply too high and are unfair to hard-working, tax-paying Hermosa Beach residents. Other beach towns charge MUCH lower rates to their residents. Manhattan Beach only charges \$30 per car for a residential parking permit and Redondo Beach only charges \$15 per car for preferential street parking for residents. The proposed Hermosa fees seem particularly unfair when compared to Santa Monica, which charges MUCH lower resident parking permit fees. As I understand it, Santa Monica charges only \$15/year for up to 2 resident permits and \$15/year for up to 2 visitor permits. For four permits, their fees would total \$60. The Hermosa city council's proposal constitutes a 1166% increase over the Santa Monica cost.

I very much look forward to the rejection of this proposal and the consideration of other revenue-raising proposals that do not penalize residents. Many thanks for your attention to these comments.

While I will not be able to attend tonight's meeting, I wanted to weigh in on the issue of increasing the parking permit fees. Since you will be reviewing many such letters, I'll be brief.

Raising the fees will not alleviate the parking problem in Hermosa Beach. Hermosa Beach is a small and densely populated town with an incredible beach and great night life. That means that in addition to the nearly 20 thousand people who live here, many others want to visit.

If Hermosa Beach is trying to use the permit fees to increase revenues, it will work, but unfairly at the sole expense of those who live and/or own property in the impacted zone.

I am not opposed to modest increases in fees each year, but no permit should cost more than \$100 and each property owner or tenant should be able to acquire at least one permit (hanging or fixed) at a reasonable cost for each unit.

Lastly, if the city is truly trying to improve parking, maybe it's time to start monitoring the use of garages. Although intended for cars, it is far too often that I see garages filled to the ceiling with "stuff" not allowing any space for an actual car. I can assure you that contributes more to the parking problem than the price of a permit.

As a 7 year resident of Hermosa Beach and a 4 year participant in the preferential parking program, I am very opposed to the proposed updates.

Let me explain why.

I think everyone is in agreement that convenient parking is difficult in the current Preferential Parking program.

But this isn't due to the price of a parking pass or the ease of obtaining a parking pass.

As I drive past blocks of parked cars, I notice many of them without parking placards or decals and maybe a parking ticket.

The true problem that I have observed is that there are people willing to risk getting a ticket in order to get parking.

I understand that this provides very important revenue to the city.

Therefore, my solution is to raise of the price of parking tickets, as much as triple the posted rates, for parking in preferred spots.

There is precedent for this during holidays. I believe it fixes the main problem that I have observed by deterring defiant drivers from taking preferred parking.

This should also increase revenue without burdening the residents and voters that actually benefit from the program as intended.

Raising the price of the passes will certainly reduce the number of passes being sold, but I don't think it will make parking noticeably easier for the residents and voters that pay an even higher premium for a pass.

Maybe a combination of raising permit fees modestly (\$10-20) AND raising parking tickets significantly (at least double for preferred spots only) will improve the situation drastically.

To Whom It May Concern,

My name is Eric Keavney and unfortunately I cannot attend the public hearing regarding the proposed fee increase for parking permits. I am a 16 year resident of Hermosa Beach and been a homeowner for the past 12 years. Currently I am a full-time graduate student and would like to express to you how the proposed increase will impact me and how that will affect the city.

I currently have three vehicles registered and also purchase a guest pass annually. Although the \$160 cost is difficult while living on a budget, it has so far been worth it for the sake of convenience. My vehicles are a pickup truck, a sport utility vehicle, and a motorcycle. My condominium has one parking place so there are always two vehicles parked on the street near my residence.

If the proposed parking fee increase is implemented my bill will increase from \$160 to \$700 per year, a 437.5% increase. I will respond to these increases by not buying any permits. Instead of generating \$540 of additional revenue the city will in fact lose \$160 from its current revenues.

It is not practical to dispose of any of these vehicles at this time so instead I will be parking two vehicles in other peoples' neighborhoods 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. With the added inconvenience of accessing these vehicles due to the distance, I will likely ride the motorcycle when weather is permitting and leave the pickup and the SUV on the city streets in front of other peoples' households most of the time.

I also will not be purchasing a guest pass any longer. Instead, my suggestions to visitors will be to meet me in other cities which are between our homes and thus more convenient for them. Currently people who are driving to visit me often come to our city in order to have dinner or go to the beach, but if they will have to pay for parking anyway it seems more equitable that I will share the driving responsibility and meet them somewhere else.

From my perspective the fee increase will immediately accomplish three things:

Less revenue generated from the parking permit process.

Increase of parking in residential neighborhoods not controlled by parking

permits.

Less revenue in the form of taxes from money spent in local businesses.

I also feel there is something inherently unfair in imposing these city fees on only certain people in the community. I realize the fiscal difficulties all cities are facing these days but shouldn't that be a burden shared by an entire community.
